## Hockey Trophy Is Presented

### MACKENZIE-WIGMORE HOCKEY LEAGUE

The hockey games played for the Mackenzie-Wigmore Trophy are completed, after being contested by four teams, namely: Stanley "Dairy Kings," French River, "Nationals," Sea View and "Maple Leafs" and Graham's Road "Monarchs." The last named carrying off the prize.

The preliminary games resulted in the elimination of the French River Nationals, who, although having a poor start, come up in their last game to defeat the trophy winners by a 2-1 victory.

In the semi-final games, French River defeated the Sea View Maple Leafs in the final play-offs. The best two out of three games was to decide the winner, and the first of these was played in Sea View on Feb. 21st. At this match, Elmer MacLeod of Graham's Road, scored the only goal of the game, thus giving his team a one-goal lead.

The Sea View Maple Leafs came to Graham's Road, Feb. 23rd, and a large attendance of fans witnessed the game, which proved to be the final and was undoubtedly, the fastest game of the series.

Graham's Road Monarchs proclaimed themselves the best team in the league by defeating the visiting team.

In the first period, the Monarchs had the play. Elmer MacLeod (Graham's Road) scored the only goal, on a pass from Leigh Campbell, toward the end of the session.

The second period was the scene of fast, rugged hockey. Elmer MacLeod broke into the scoring column while two of the Monarchs were serving penalties, the Leafs did their utmost to even the score, and but for the sensational work of Oscar McKay, the result might have been different. It was at this time that L. Rogers scored the only goal that Sea View managed in the game. While all the Leafs were storming the Graham's Road citadel, Leigh Campbell broke away and led a wild rush.

Sea View zone and out-skated all his pursuers. Just as he was about to shoot an apparent sure goal it was discovered that a flying Maple Leaf stick had, with uncanny accuracy, carried the puck to the corner of the rink. The defender won five minutes in the penalty box.

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## The Value of Seed Treatment

(Experimental Farms Note)  
Much experimental work has been done to devise methods of seed treatment to protect from fungicidal and bacterial diseases which are seed-borne. It has been shown generally that any benefits derived from seed treatments can be traced to a reduction in the number of organisms which are present either on or in the seed or in the seed bed.

Some experiments seem to show that treatment of disease free seed with fungicides in the form of stimulation. This is not necessarily true, since diseases are not always evident externally, and the apparent stimulation may be in reality increased vigor due to the control of some parasite which is not evident. On the other hand, when germination is delayed by cold wet soil, fungicidal dusts may protect the seeds and seedlings from attack by soil organisms.

The average annual loss in Canada from cereal rust diseases for the period 1926-32 was estimated at over \$12,000,000. During the 12 year period 1920-1932, 20,000,000 bushels of western Canadian wheat were graded smutty. This represented a direct loss of approximately \$2,000,000 due to reduction in grade alone. A quite different disease is common rootrot which is widespread and often severe on cereals in the prairie provinces. Loss from this trouble were estimated at \$5,500,000 annually in Saskatchewan for the three year period ending in 1931. A recent survey of available seed was estimated to show that about 50 per cent of wheat seed samples carry fungi of some kind. Some are important as causes of rootrot, while others only attack broken and injured seeds.

Proper treatment of the seed of cereals will destroy the spores of smut, rootrots and mould. In this respect, it should be mentioned that certain dust fungicides are becoming popular because of their ease of handling and general efficiency. Organic mercury dusts, sold under various names, are very effective against smuts, and tests conducted at the Dominion Laboratory of Plant Pathology, Saskatoon, have shown that they likewise control rootrots to some extent. Formalin is very effective in the control of smuts but frequently causes seed injury.

Information on the condition of seed grain and the use of fungicides can be obtained from Dominion Laboratory of Plant Pathology at Ottawa, Winnipeg, Saskatoon and Edmonton.

## FEBRUARY BETTER IN TORONTO LIST

TORONTO, March 9—(CP)—Despite the shorter month, February trading on the Toronto Stock Exchange amounted to 20,791,800 shares, an increase of 1,185,397 over January and highest since last April. Values of shares traded at \$37,676,297 were \$422,750 higher than January, best since October, 1937.

Gold shares contributed most of the increase in activity, particularly large volume being recorded in a number of prospects and near producing issues. Substantial gains were recorded by a number of these secondaries, but the golds as a whole finished the month at slightly lower levels. Considerable irregularity was shown in price movements in individual divisions and the Exchange's index of 20 representative issues consequently held within a range of less than four points.
