It is the breaking down of the tradition under which nobody must address a monarch unless first spoken to by his Majesty. It is now intimated that at private dinner parties, at least, the convives must not hesitate either to make original remarks or even to broach new subjects for conversation. As the King and Queen are going to dine out regularly the coming season, the innovation is causing a great stir in those circles in which hospitality is likely to be extended to royalty. It is hailed as an admirable move. Queen Alexandra still adheres to the old custom, possibly on account of the fact that her deafness makes it difficult for her to follow the general conversation.
