desirability of supplying agricultural, technical and domestic science instruction, without abandoning the means of providing instruction preparatory to taking a regular college course. The Province needs both, and Mr. Stewart's rather sweeping condemnation of the present system is out of line with the educational progress of all advanced countries.

We are of those who believe that Prince of Wales College has done much good work in the past, and that razing it to the ground, or transforming it to wholly industrial teaching would not stop the exodus. Our young men and young women, if deprived of the privileges now afforded them there would join the exodus and seek abroad the instruction denied them at home.

The regrettable exodus from our Province has its origin in no one cause, but in many. The desire for change, or to see the world, is strong. The old farm is not big enough for the five boys. Not every boy or girl is content to follow the same calling as his or her father or mother. They want a larger field, the chance of more varied employment than they can find here.

There are a number of smaller towns higher up the river, which turn their sewage into the stream from which the capital city receives its water supply. When the Ottawa is in full flow this constant contamination passes almost unnoticed.

ation is much greater in proportion than at other times. This is the explanation given by the resident physicians.

The result is that there are hundreds of cases of typhoid fever in Ottawa, the hospitals being filled to overflowing and as many more patients being cared for in their homes while doctors and nurses are working overtime. Incidentally the great mills and manufacturing industries dependent upon water power are in part or wholly shut down, and the fire service of the city is inadequate for an emergency from the same cause.

An obvious lesson from the outbreak is the need of legislation to prevent the dumping of sewage into rivers. Here in Charlottetown we may in the meantime thankfully congratulate ourselves upon an abundant supply of water that is pure and wholesome.

THE PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

A partial statement of the public accounts of the Province was printed in the Patriot Saturday, and is reproduced in The Guardian today. We speak of it as partial in the sense that while the details of the receipts are given, there is no detailed statement of the expenditure. Still the statement affords some fair indication of how the finances of the Province stand, and the Government is to be commended for taking the proper, if unusual course, of making it public in advance of the meeting of the Legislature.

According to the published statement the total receipts of the Province for the past year were \$375,151.32 and the total expenditure \$403,205.65, showing an excess of expenditure over the receipts of \$28,054.33. The ordinary expenditure for the year is set down at \$371,269.11, or some \$3,852.21 less than the receipts but the large charge of \$20,314.54 to capital account seems likely to be challenged. It appears from the Patriot that this includes \$8,867.25 for the Experimental Farm and \$5,649.92 for repairs to the Hospital for the Insane.

The increase of liabilities for the year is set down at \$14,150.37. The increased receipts from the land tax owing to the readjustment of land values will not appear till next year, although the receipts were larger from this source and from income tax than in previous years. The total receipts for 1910 from the income, land and road taxes appear to have been as below:

JAPAN'S REVELATIONS WITH THE WORLD

(Continued from page 1.) Japan with foreign powers. "The relations of Japan with foreign powers," said Count Komura, "have been steadily growing in cordiality, unhampered by any incidents standing in the way of international friendships. Above all, it will be noted with the highest gratification that the Anglo-Japanese alliance, which has been constantly gaining

additional strength and solidity, continues to be a powerful factor in the preservation of general peace in the East."

Speaking of the agreement of July 4 last, between Japan and Russia, in adjustment of their respective interests in Manchuria, Count Komura said:

"It appears that in some quarters this last understanding has been looked upon with a sense of suspicion and misgiving. I have no hesitation in positively declaring that it has for its sole object the maintenance of the status quo in Manchuria, and of the enduring peace in the Far East by confirming the principles and supplementing the provisions laid down in the convention of 1907."

He added that both governments had been dealing with questions in "the spirit of harmonious co-operation and mutual accommodation." With regard to the annexation of Korea, Count Komura said: "I am happy to be able to state that the powers recognize the inevitable nature of the act of annexation in view of the special position of Japan, as well as the general situation in the extreme East."

"In consequence of the act of annexation, the treaties concluded by Korea with foreign powers ceased to be binding, and Japan's existing treaties have been extended to Korea. At the same time, the right of extra-territoriality which foreigners formerly enjoyed in Korea, came finally to an end. The Imperial Government felt justified in regarding such right as ended upon the termination of Korea's treaties, by which it was called into existence, considering that the continuance of the system would have been prejudicial to the satisfactory working and unification of administration in Korea. Moreover, it seemed natural that foreigners being allowed on the

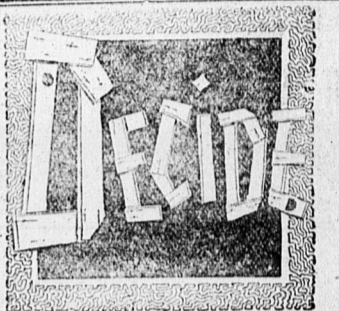
