It is the intention of the Provincial Government to put their Mud Dredge into operation this season at the earliest possible date. Parties desirous of obtaining mud from them will please make application at once to the Secretary of Public Works, Charlottetown.

The price of mud will be \$12.00 per car of 25,000 lbs., f. o. b. Midgell, payable in advance and all freight on mud shipped to way stations must be paid in advance. Mud must be unloaded within 48 hours from the time of its arrival at its destination.

Should it be found that the mud can be produced at a lower rate than the amount charged, namely \$12.00 per car, the difference in the cost and the amount paid will be related to the parties obtaining same.
