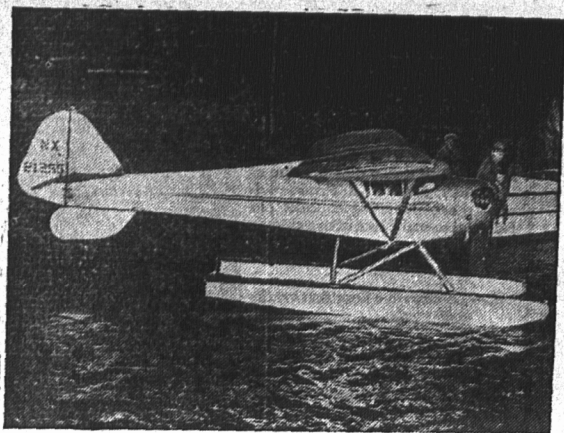


NEWS of the WORLD in PICTURES



A new claimed record for light seaplanes had been set when Dewey Eldred of Winghamby, O., brought this craft down on the water off Bay Shore, L. I. Doing ten laps over a stretch off the Long Island shore, Eldred completed 1242-mile course in 16 hours, 58 minutes and 32 seconds, an average speed of more than 73 miles per hour.

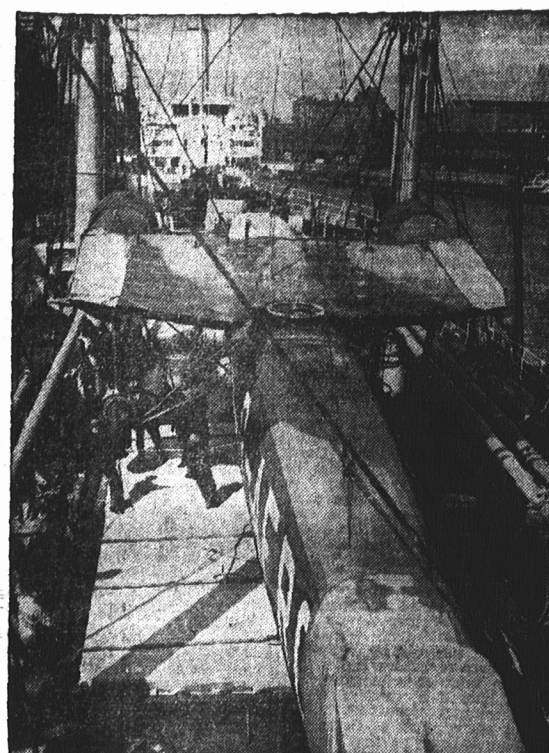

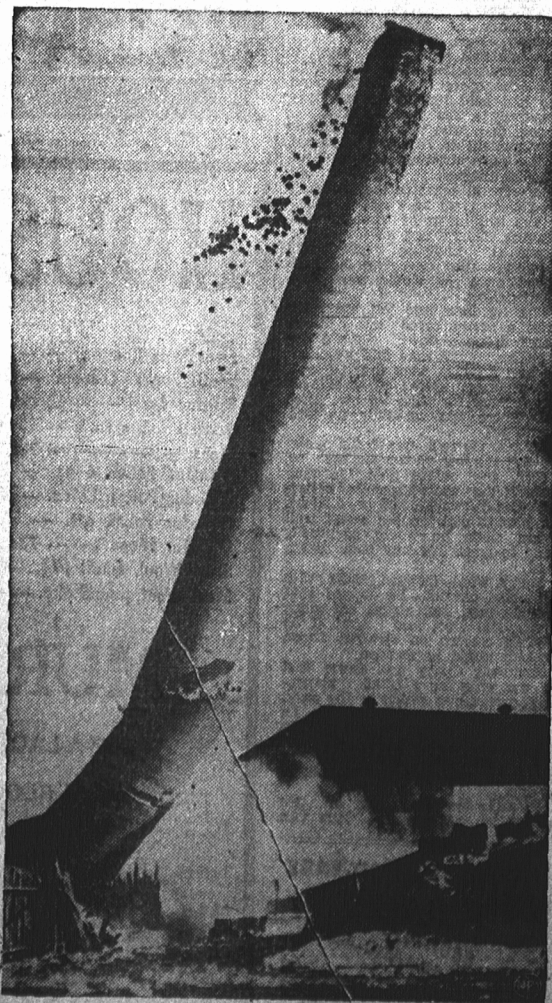

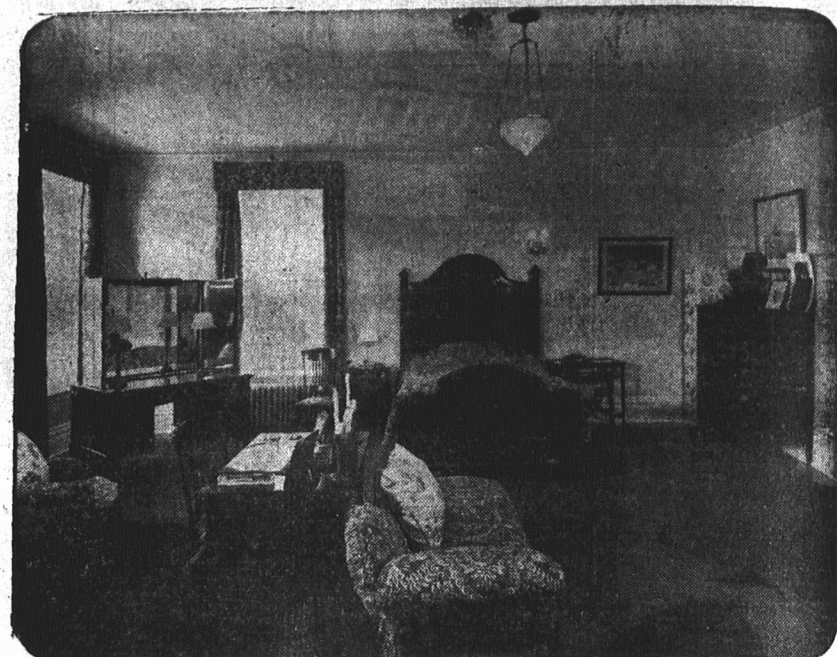

They will work the refuelling system invented by Sir Allan Cobham, famous long-distance flier.



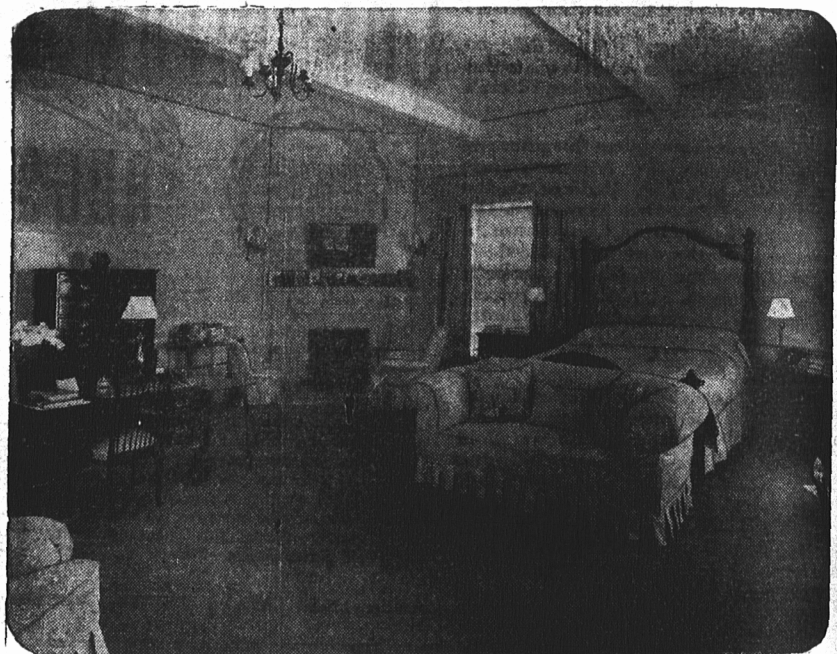
Down to earth crashes this 35-year-old, 135-foot stack at Norway, Mich., caught by camera just after powder blast ripped out its foundation.

Government House At Ottawa Prepares For Their Majesties

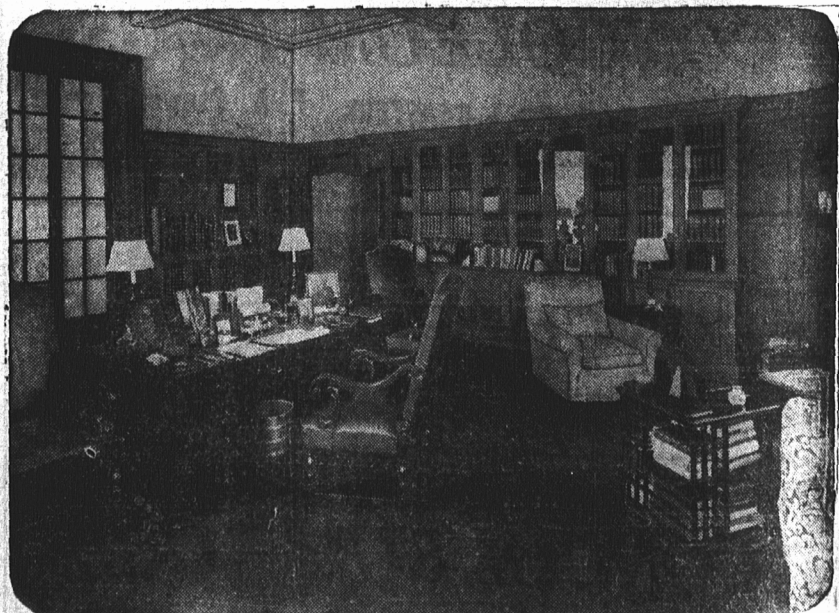
Edison Hall has been redecorated for the visit of the King and Queen and here are shown the rooms they will occupy during their forthcoming stay in Canada's capital.
