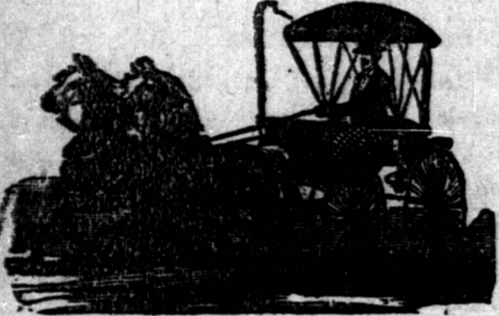

THE MATTER OF ADDRESSES.

Lord Minto during his brief visit to Charlottetown was made the recipient of three addresses. As these documents go they were models of their kind, not very long, fitly and sincerely expressing the feelings and wishes of the various bodies of people in whose behalf they were spoken. But it is worth while perhaps to pause and consider the feelings of the distinguished recipient of these honors. How many times their Excellencies in a tour through Canada have to listen to the repetition of the same loyal sentiments, the same good wishes, cordial welcome, and hopes for future happiness? What becomes of all the addresses at the end of a Viceregal tour? Are they framed to grace the ancestral halls of the nobleman who receives them, or treasured up and transmitted among their heirlooms, or simply scattered to the void as something which like the newspaper of the day perishes after one reading?

Shortly the son and heir of King Edward will visit Canada, after making the tour of other Colonies beyond the seas. What a collection of loyal addresses he must be already encumbered with! And how many more await him as he will journey through this long Dominion from the Atlantic to the Pacific. There is a story extant, cited by the Ottawa Free Press, that when some one ventured at Rideau Hall to congratulate the Marquis of Lorne and Princess Louise upon the number of loyal addresses they had received between Halifax and the Capital the Princess jocosely remarked, "Yes, I believe if they were unrolled and joined they would reach as far as Halifax." And to the reading of all these, and twice as many more presented in Ontario and the West, the Marquis and Princess had been compelled to listen, standing, and the Marquis to reply to each. There appears to be a suffering side to all this. It would surely be a relief to the Duke of Cornwall if he could simply have the numerous addresses handed in and considered as read. The newspapers could give them any necessary publicity on the same day or the day following.

The longest freight train ever hauled on a railway was moved recently on the Northern Pacific from Jamestown to Fargo by a single locomotive of great power. The train consisted of 125 box cars and was 5,830 feet, or over a mile in length.

A new type-setting machine, invented by Alexander Dow and described with illustrations in the latest issue of the Scientific American, is claimed to be a great advance upon the wonderfully ingenious machines already in use for this purpose. The machine uses foundry types, and is said to combine the elements of simplicity, accuracy and speed.

In Connecticut free employment bureaux have been established at which, without charge, the wants of employers and of those seeking employment are made known to each other. Private employment agencies are not abolished, but made subject to a special license fee of \$10 and a bond for \$500. The free employment bureaux is an extension of socialistic ideas.

The fine thread spun by the spider, and its strength in proportion to size has long been a subject of wonder. The microscope has now revealed that each thread is made up of a thousand or more strands. The finest thread which man can produce is like a ship's cable compared with the spider's production. The many strands are not twisted together but unite by their own gummy, or sticky nature.

Fuller accounts of the recent trial of Santos Dumont's flying machine at Paris tell that moving in a large circle he made a speed of 37 miles an hour. The height above ground varied from 320 to 380 feet. During the trial the aeronaut descended six times at spots indicated by the judges and rose again at will. The successful experiment has aroused world-wide interest.

By arrangements recently made gold miners can not only have their gold dust assayed but cashed in British Columbia. The Provincial Government has effected this, acting in conjunction with the newly established federal assay office. At the assay offices the owner will receive a certificate of the weight and fineness of his metal, and this certificate can be cashed at any bank in British Columbia.

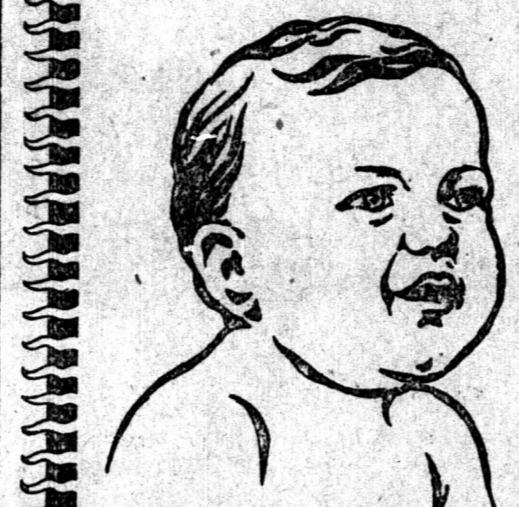
Lord Pauncefoote has well filled the position of British Ambassador at Washington during his term of service. He likes the American people and is well appreciated by them in return. Recently on the eve of his departure on a visit to England he said: "The Americans are the most genial people on the face of the earth. At the first grip of the hand they take you to their hearts. So long as you do not try to deal in an underhand way, and so long as you do not assume a superior air, they treat you as one of their own, and no one could say more than this."

Mrs. Kruger, wife of ex-President Kruger died at Pretoria on Sunday last; of pneumonia after a short illness of only three days. She was 67 years of age. Long separation from her husband, who has been in Europe for many months past, and the recent death of her favorite daughter, had, it is said, greatly depressed Mrs. Kruger's spirits. The leading English papers treat the event most sympathetically. Mr. Kruger on being informed of the event is said to have exclaimed, "She was a good wife; we quarreled on y once, and that was six months after we were married."

Mr. Pickford of Ploxford and Black has returned from the West Indies where he has been going from island to island since December last. He states that there has been a large increase this year in Canadian imports of sugar, molasses and cocoa by the steamers of his line. There is also an increase of Canadian exports to the West Indies, notably in flour, which has now come to be regarded as a staple article. This is assuring. Mr. Pickford states, however, that much Canadian flour being shipped through the states, is still sold in West India markets as American.

The electric, or trolley cars, as they are commonly called have passed through three stages. The first stage was when the trolley succeeded the horse cars. Next came the extensions from the large cities to the suburban towns. The final stage was reached by which these systems were connected and through lines established. It is now practicable to make long journeys in New England, in New York State and even in the west by the trolley cars alone. The Cleveland Leader tells that within two months it will be practicable to journey from Detroit to Chicago by the trolley cars at a cost of 60 cents per mile.

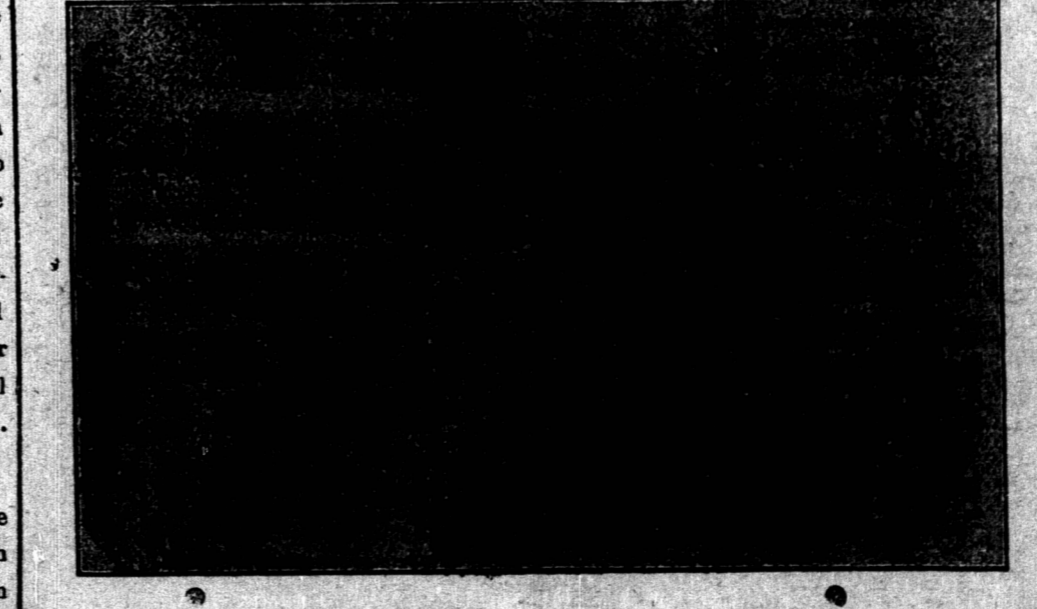
