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Text Of Speech By Dr. Manion

OTTAWA, March 20—Following is the partial text of the speech today by Conservative Leader Manion on international affairs in the House of Commons:

"I can say it is time for the democracies of the world, for the United Kingdom, France, the United States, the British Dominions, the smaller nations and all other peoples of the world who want to stop this mad ambition of Hitler's to stand together and make it clear that they are standing together morally at any rate."

"I am not talking war, but it seems to me that the only way we can stop war is to show that there is a solid front among all the democratic nations and all other peoples of the world against the attempts of this man to dominate the whole world."

"There are people who say that war is inevitable and I have had that stated to me by outstanding people, but I do not believe that war is inevitable. As Earl Baldwin said at the time of the September crisis, if there is only a five per cent chance of peace, I am in favor of peace, and I believe in the democratic peoples of the world presenting a united front."

"I am glad to hear you, Mr. Speaker, and to the House of Commons that I am a strong peace lover. I am just as much in favor of peace as Mr. Chamberlain or the Prime Minister or any member of this House could possibly be. I am a peace lover from the bottom of my soul. I did have the opportunity to see, if I may be forgiven for mentioning it, the cruelties and horrors of war at first hand."

"I saw strong young, healthy men turned into nervous wrecks, crying for help; I saw mutilations and cases of blindness; and we all know that 60,000 of our best Canadian soldiers died in the last war on the world. And today because of dictatorship, particularly the German dictatorship, armaments are greater today than ever before."

"We know what war involves, and what it does to the world. It has served as the most antagonistic to war. I think there is no body of people in all Canada that is so antagonistic to war as the four or five hundred thousand returned men in this country. They are the strongest for peace."

"We saw that holocaust war which was to make the world safe for democracy but did not do so. Democracy is in a more precarious position today than it has ever been. The war to end war, as it was supposed to have been, failed to end war. Our ideals have been shattered."

"On top of all that knowledge I have three sons of my own. I am a father who loves his children and does not want to see them used for cannon fodder. I sympathize with all fathers and mothers, and so I say that I have every reason in the world to hate war from the bottom of my heart. But we must remember self-preservation, not only of our own country but of all these nations. The whole aim of my remarks today is not to say what we must do in war, but my aim is to prevent war if at all possible, and I say that all the democratic nations should stand together in a moral protest at this time, a very stern moral protest against this man Hitler and his attempt to dominate the world. We must show a united front and show it frankly and courageously, and if we all do that, there will probably be no war. That, sir, is the prayer of us all."

"I close my remarks by reading a sentence or two I have had typed because I want to give it exactly as I have it here: "As Leader of the National Conservative Party I offer now to join loyally and wholeheartedly with the Government in making it clear to all the world that a united Canadian people—with one mind and one heart—is determined, come what may, to preserve its liberties and its nationhood. And may God assist us in our efforts."

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Text Of Speech By Premier King

OTTAWA, March 20—(CP)—The text of Prime Minister Mackenzie King's statement on foreign affairs in the House of Commons today follows:

"The developments of the past week render it desirable that I should make a brief statement on the international situation. Many of the factors are not yet clear. When I come to take up the estimates of the Department of External Affairs, I shall seek to go fully into many questions which have arisen in the past few months, have created for Canada, as for other countries, a certain anxiety."

"I have been taken to task for some guarded references I made at the beginning of the month to the European situation. I pointed out the situation was still existing in a critical world, and that at some moment we might be called upon to consider the situation in the light of our own country's force of arms, we will resist to the last and defend our independence," one Lithuanian said.

other countries as would be appropriate. I note that in speaking of Westminister today, Mr. Chamberlain told the House of Commons that the situation "requires to give full consideration to the European situation in conjunction with other powers before any statement can be made."

Canada at all times has been prepared to consult, as occasion might arise, with other freedom loving countries as to the most effective means to be taken in order to prevent aggression. The form of such co-operation and the contingencies which may arise, are questions which this Government will examine, in consultation with other Governments. It will report its findings and any proposals that may be made to the Parliament which has the sole and responsible authority to speak for Canada in such grave issues.

My Government has continued and enlarged the Youth Training Scheme inaugurated in the Province in co-operation with the Government of Canada. Additional courses have been conducted throughout the Province on the subjects of agriculture, poultry, fisheries, forestry, practical carpentry, handicrafts, domestic science, home nursing and leadership; and we are able to take advantage of the added subjects of tourist catering and of practical mechanics and blacksmithing. The courses have been able to accommodate an increased number of students. It is anticipated that the annual repetition of these courses will enable my Government to develop and improve the instruction provided, by more specialization.

like Mr. Chamberlain, there is one thing I must except, and that is the liberty which we enjoy and which we will never surrender. I believe this is the feeling of every Canadian who loves his country and cherishes its liberties. In common with His Majesty's loyal subjects throughout Canada, the people of Prince Edward Island look forward with eager expectation to the forthcoming Canadian tour of Their Majesty King George VI and Queen Elizabeth. We are particularly gratified to learn that a visit to Prince Edward Island is included in the program of Their Majesty's tour of Canada. The citizens of this Province will be honoured and delighted to welcome them and to express their loyalty and devotion to their beloved Sovereign and His gracious Consort.

The present year will also be marked by another event of great national significance, in the seventy-fifth anniversary of the meeting at Charlottetown of the delegates who first formally discussed plans for the Canadian Confederation. With the co-operation of the Government of Canada, my Government is making plans for the fitting celebration of this important anniversary. Following closely upon the Royal Visit to Canada, the Confederation anniversary, whose celebration will begin on July 16th, should play an important part in emphasizing the essential unity and integrity of the Dominion. It is hoped that a large number of prominent members of the Dominion Government and of Provincial Governments throughout Canada will attend and take part in the ceremonies.

My Government has viewed with approval the success of the Government of Canada in negotiating a further improved trade agreement with the United States of America. It is confidently anticipated that the new agreement will be highly beneficial to our primary producers, particularly as regards the improvement of our market for potatoes, hogs, live stock, and fishery products. We are also confident that the revision of trade agreements between the United States of America and British Columbia will result in a more cordial political and international relationship and will play a large part in laying more secure foundations for a lasting world peace.

Agriculture and livestock production of the Province again maintained a high standard of production and quality throughout the past year, although the potato crop was seriously affected by blight in some sections. An acute shortage of seed grain was averted by the policy established by my Government for the distribution of seed oats. The livestock and dairy industries of the Province continue to be the backbone of our agriculture, and increased emphasis is being placed by my Government on their promotion and improvement. Considerable progress has also been made in the development of fruit production and in the processing of agricultural and fish products.

With the aid of a continued grant from the Government of Canada, my Government has maintained its policy of assisting the re-establishment of needy fishermen by the purchase of fishing equipment. Several additional fish buildings have also been erected and equipped at various centres throughout the Province for the use and benefit of fishermen in storing and processing their products. Shortage of catch and inadequacy of markets have continued to prevent many of our fishermen from earning a fair living. It is hoped that the new American trade agreements will improve market conditions, and that our fishermen will also substantially benefit from improved methods of processing and marketing.

During the past year my Government has also made provision for increased activity in agricultural education by the appointment of a specially qualified agricultural instructor to the staff of Prince of Wales College. My Government continues to co-operate in the extension of the adult Education Movement and in the promotion and study of improved methods of co-operative marketing.

During the past year my Government has conducted the most interesting and the most interesting of public services. Financing has been carried on at extremely low rates of interest and the sinking funds are maintained at a very high and satisfactory level. In the preparation and passing of the estimates for the present year, it has been exercised towards maintaining a substantial balance of current revenues and expenditures.

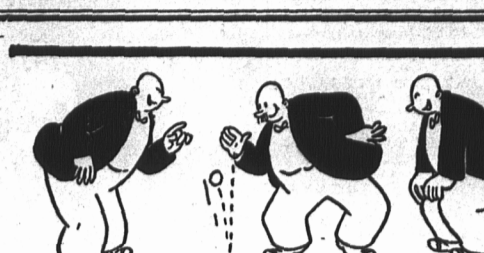
During the past year my Government has continued its program of hard-surfacing and upgrading the main trunk highways of the Province. The expenditures necessary for these projects are made possible by the establishment of a special sinking fund provided from an additional tax on gasoline, with the result that the cost of such improved highways will be paid for as they are used by the motorists who principally benefit from their construction. Returns of special revenue from gasoline tax indicate that a sufficient sinking fund will be provided from that source to justify the hard-surfacing of all the main trunk roads of the Province and also the paving of the main streets of such villages as do not happen to be on the trunk highways. My Government's programme of highway construction has also served to provide a large amount of much needed employment throughout every section of the Province.

The tourist industry continues to grow in importance, and to provide increased employment and revenue for those actively engaged in catering to tourists, as well as in furnishing an excellent home market for the products of our farms and fisheries. The growth of this industry is being greatly stimulated by the establishment of a National Park whose development is proceeding rapidly under the direction of the Dominion Department of Mines and Technical Surveys. Great improvements have been provided by the Dominion Government for the transfer of automobiles on the Borden-Tormentine ferry route. Arrangements have also been made for improved railway connections and schedules on that route. It is further anticipated that the Wood Islands automobile ferry service will be inaugurated at the beginning of the 1940 season.

A substantial grant from the Dominion Government has enabled my Government to embark on a programme of improving the high standard of living in the highlands leading to the National Park. A considerable extent of road was subgraded and gravelled under this programme during the past year and it is anticipated that the programme will be continued and extended during the present season. This programme of highway improvement is an important factor in relieving unemployment and in providing increased employment. It is of great benefit, not only to tourists and others who wish to visit our National Park, but to the residents of the localities through which these highways pass.

My Government has continued during the past year to carry on the customary public health services of the Province, with a substantial increase in the maintenance of the Provincial Sanatorium. My Government has also co-operated with the Provincial Sanatorium Commission in the construction of residential buildings for nurses and employees of the Institution. This move will have the advantage of providing a large increase in the number of patients which can be accommodated in the main hospital building. It is regarded as urgently important that a still further increase in accommodation for patients should be provided, and my Government is asked to co-operate further in the construction of a convalescent building in connection with the Provincial Sanatorium.

Although agricultural conditions in the Province have shown marked improvement during the past three years, my Government views with alarm the large number of farmers who, through depletion of their stocks and resources, are unable to take advantage of the general recovery. Many farms throughout the Province are unoccupied, with a still greater number below a reasonable standard of productivity. On the other hand, a great number of unemployed young men are prevented by lack of capital and credit from establishing themselves in the agricultural industry, for which they are well qualified. It is realized that great caution must be exercised in dealing with this urgent problem. My Government will submit for your consideration the necessity of formulating a scheme of agricultural rehabilitation, under adequate control and supervision, and the desirability of beginning a comprehensive and detailed survey of the situation without further delay. license. Not being legitimate tenants they cannot be evicted. In forms, as such. What protection has the landlord against this? He hires some stalwarts to pick them on the streets, you will find the moralists, philanthropists, testing such cruelty, but take away him putting his hands in his pocket, to help pay the taxes on that house.

Mr. Homming's three months' notice and yearly lease idea was crystallized into law, how beautifully it would work into the hands of those bums. A three months' certain tenancy, free of rent, perhaps he will claim that you can have a clause "to enter and possess in default of payment". That clause is in every lease, but in practice it is never used. It is written on. You have to get out of possession, involving expense and lengthy delays, or adopt the force method of above paragraph with technical risks added.

Now I have a tenancy of over 35 years standing. This without lease or writing in any form. It is still occupied by same business with a word of frolic, of difficulty of

I have had leases in which changes and repairs were specifically to be done by the tenant at his own expense, even giving reduced rent for the cost of repairs. In almost every case of such had applications innumerable, for this that and the other thing, until in exasperation I have had to tell them to read their agreement, and if not satisfied, to get out. Of some hundreds of tenants I can only recall three who respected these agreements.

But for space I would mention many other items, even more damaging, actual and deliberate destruction of property, of which the law gives the landlord little or no protection.

Now if our talented friend, Mr. Homming, would direct his energies towards getting some legal advice and restraints to protect property holders from these exploiters, and to force compliance with agreements as now recognized, it would surely be more effective as a regulation to stabilize tenancies, and less encouragement to the parasites abounding in this connection.

There has existed a long and want for the consolidation and revision of the statutes of the Province, which have continued unrevoked since the commencement of 1773. During the past three years you have begun this work by enacting consolidations of several important acts. My Government has now prepared amendments to you a consolidation of the Statute of 1773, and the consolidation of all outstanding legislation passed from 1773 to 1909 inclusive, a period of one hundred and thirty-seven years. In this manner an effective and useful consolidation statute law may be carried out without any considerable expense. It is hoped that the revision and consolidation of our statutes may be brought up to the next session of the Legislature.

I trust that your deliberations will, under Divine Providence, contribute to the welfare of this Province.
