### LINDBERGH'S IN AZORES

HORTA, Azores, Nov. 21. — (A.P.)—Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh received a greeting of flowers and cheers this afternoon as they completed a 900-mile flight from Lisbon, Portugal.  
The entire populace of Fayal Island welcomed the flyers and brought them arms full of flowers. They hopped from Lisbon at 7.25 a. m., Greenwich time (2.25 a. m., E. S. T.) and at 4.20 p. m., Greenwich Time (11.20 a. m., E. S. T.) made a smooth landing against a strong wind on Horta Bay.  
Col. and Mrs. Lindbergh smiled in reply to the cheers and apparently were not tired from the flight. They went to the Fayal Hotel after refusing several offers of private hospitality.  
They declined to discuss their plans, but it was understood they intend to continue their trans-Atlantic flight by way of Bermuda after conducting several survey flights over the Islands of Terceira and San Miguel with Horta as the base.

### U.S. DOLLAR WEAKENS

(Associated Press)  
LONDON, Nov. 22—The United States dollar after a comparatively quiet day revealed a weakening tendency this afternoon especially after the announcement of an increase in the United States gold price and in final transactions was quoted at \$5.32 1/2 to the pound, the day's lowest level.  
Speculative activity was restricted in earlier dealings pending United States currency developments.  
The official close at \$5.31 1/2 represented a loss of 3/4 cents. The dollar opened at \$5.27 1/2, compared to Saturday's close at \$5.27 1/2.  
The French franc, which was more prominent today than the dollar because of continued depreciation on sterling, ended the day at 83.06 francs to the pound, compared to an official close at 82.03 and Saturday's finish at 82.65.  
The United States dollar closed in Paris at 15.74 francs (6.35 cents to the franc), as against Saturday's final rate of 15.65 francs (6.389 cents).

### WILL INCREASE WORKING CREW AT N.B. CAMP

(Canadian Press)  
FREDERICTON, N. B., Nov. 22.—The strength of the working parties at the artillery range and forestry experimental station in Sunbury County will be increased during the coming winter to about six hundred men, according to Brig. L. R. Parsons, C.M.G., D.S.O., Officer Commanding Military District No. 7.  
The winter crews will consist of New Brunswick, large numbers of which will be recruited at various centres of the province and brought in here within the next few weeks for outfitting.  
As the range-project is a Maritime matter, employment will be given ultimately to several hundred men from the sister provinces, but the extent of this phase of the employment will depend on the amount of money voted by the Dominion Parliament during the coming session. Military districts headquarters are providing for the winter's activity on the basis of the federal grant already available which provides for the carrying on of the work up to March 31, 1934, when the federal financial year ends.
