

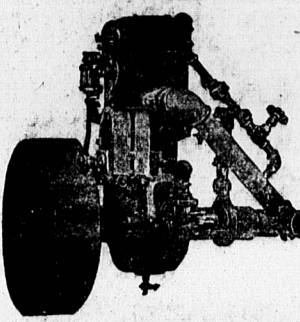

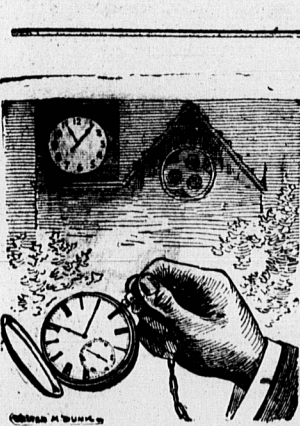

RESIDENTS MEETING CONCERNING BORINGS

BARNSCLIFFE, Feb. 23.—A meeting of Cherry Valley, China Point, Barnsccliffe and vicinity, was held on Monday evening last, to consider the matter in which the recent boring operations at Barnsccliffe have been conducted.

Mr. Leroy said he had been asked, and telegraphed Mr. Brook yesterday and got permission. J. C. Irving said they were all glad to see Mr. Leroy. He would like to know if it was possible to go 2500 feet, and what were the prospects here.

Mr. Leroy said there were some things he would not care to answer. Would not care to say it was impossible. Mr. Murphy, I presume you are acting under orders?

Mr. Leroy said the jump or drum drill is used in boring for gas and oil, principally. He thought it would work all right in this formation, perhaps better than a large size diamond drill which might clog in shales.

CONCLUSION OF MINISTERS SESSION

The Methodist Ministerial Convention of the Methodist Church concluded its meetings on Wednesday morning opening at 9 o'clock.

Rev. George Orman conducted the Devotional Exercises giving a short address on "Christ and the World." Rev. F. A. Wightman read a very excellent paper on "The Religion of Israel." A Human Development or a Divine Revelation?

Rev. J. B. Gough read a paper on "Church Union" and Rev. Hammond Johnson gave an address of "The Providence of God and the Modern Mind." These called forth much discussion by the members of the convention.

A communication from Rev. G. M. Campbell concerning the work of the Bible Society was read. A resolution expressing the sympathy of the members of the Convention for Bro. Geo. Dawson a former member of this district and his family in the loss of two members of their family.

Reference was made to the work of temperance throughout the Province. The Brethren expressing their regret that the law is not being as rigidly enforced in some sections as is desirable.

The thanks of the Convention was tendered the committee who made arrangements for the convention and also to the kind friends of the City who entertained the members of the convention during the session. The meeting closed all feeling that a very helpful and profitable time had been spent.

Local Government voted \$1000, then the Dominion Government voted \$25,000 to have the matter tested.

William Murphy said that we are not hard to satisfy. A core drill, competent inspection and a hole 2500 feet with everything on the square will satisfy all hands. He was glad to see Mr. Leroy there, and felt that we had his sympathy, even if he were not permitted to give full information.

Mr. Warburton had done his duty in the matter. The contract was between the Local and Dominion Governments and the Local Government must bear the responsibility, if they fail to have the contract carried out. Reuben McDonald spoke briefly in the matter, referring to what steps the Government had taken to have the work carried out properly, and pointing out that Mr. Leroy's statements must be given due weight as he is an expert in such work.

(Continued From Page One.) years. MR. MORSON thought the smaller investor with \$300 or \$400, ought not to be shut out.

MR. MATHIESON argued that refusal to issue smaller debentures was discriminating against the man who had only a few hundred. He must go to the savings banks and take 3 per cent. The man with thousands could buy debentures and get 4 per cent.

HON. JOSEPH READ claimed there were only three depositors with the Government for \$100 each, all the others being for larger amounts. HON. MR. CUMMISKY thought, no one would apply for a debenture of \$100 that had thirty years to run. In the deposits with the Government, which were on call there were only thirty-six under \$500 each.

MR. MCKINNON pointed out that these 36 would be forced to take their money to the savings banks and lose one per cent.

The amendment was lost on a division—15 to 12. The bill was read a third time and passed. A bill was introduced by Premier Hazard respecting the sittings of the County Court of Kings County, also a bill to prevent the spread of noxious weeds.

The House went into committee on the bill to repeal the tax on commercial travellers. Dr. Warburton in the chair. In conversational discussion it was stated that no license fees have been collected since the first of the year and no less sum was collected than for a full year before.
