MIKE MCTIGUE RETAINS LIGHT HEAVYWEIGHT TITLE

Young Stribling Had The Better of Slashing 12 Round No-Decision Contest at Newark, New Jersey Last Night.—Gong Saves Champion in 10th Round.—Southern Took Every Round by Large Margin.

Mike McTigue, light heavyweight champion of the world had a hard time saving his title last night at Newark, New Jersey, when Young Stribling gave the champion a bad lacing for the entire distance. At no time during the twelve rounds did McTigue have a chance to make anything like an even showing against the 19 year old school boy from the South. In fact throughout the contest, Mike's crown was hanging in the balance, with the "kid" all the while giving him an unmerciful beating.

It looked as though the title was going to change hands in the 10th round when Stribling had the conqueror of Siki down for the count of nine, but ring generalship saved Mike; he arose dazed and beaten, but managed to hold on for the welcome sound of the gong. The newspaper decision was given to Stribling and well might he get it, as McTigue never had a round.

The fight by rounds:

ROUND ONE

Stribling appeared quite confident, Mike opened Round by trying to rush his younger opponent, but Stribling jabbed straight left to Mike's face keeping him away. Rest was taken up by both men, working for an opening.

ROUND TWO

Mike tries left to face, Stribling counters with hard left to Mike's head and tries right to body but misses. Stribling sends left and right to Mike's head; Mike clinches. Stribling side-steps a lead from Mike and misses with left and right. Bell—Stribling's round easily.

ROUND THREE

Stribling straightened Mike up with left and right to body, and Mike tries right to body but misses. Stribling sends left and right to Mike's head; Stribling's round by a wide margin.

ROUND FOUR

Stribling sends Mike's head back with two straight lefts. Stribling sends left to Mike's face, also two lefts followed by two hard rights; Mike hangs on, and is in a very bad way. Stribling sends two lefts to head and makes a monkey of Mike—Stribling's round by large margin.

ROUND FIVE

Stribling left to face, also two right and left, Mike makes no return. Mike too dazed to make any return. Stribling's round also by wide margin.

ROUND SIX

Stribling opens six with two lefts

to nose, Mike holding to escape punishment. Stribling finishes off the round with a hard right to head.

ROUND SEVEN.

Stribling sends hard right to head. The round is featured by Mike continually holding on and going into clinches every time he can do so. Stribling's round also.

ROUND EIGHT.

Mike send feeble right to body at opening of this round. Stribling counters with left to body and then right to body, and then two lefts and a right. Mike holding, as bell rings. Stribling by wide margin.

ROUND NINE.

Mike comes out from his corner and goes straight away to a clinch. Stribling is forcing the fight, but seems too excited to get him off for the "hay-maker." Stribling sends both hands to body, and has the champion dazed, and holding on, Mike getting worse all the time and is very leg weary.

ROUND TEN.

Stribling sends left to body, also right to head and left to body. Mike clinches to save himself, Stribling sends hard right and left to head, and sends champion down. Mike rises only to run into a series of lefts and rights; champion is out on his feet, and only his ring craft, and the fact that Stribling is over anxious saves him from being put down for the count. Bell comes to the timely aid of Mike.

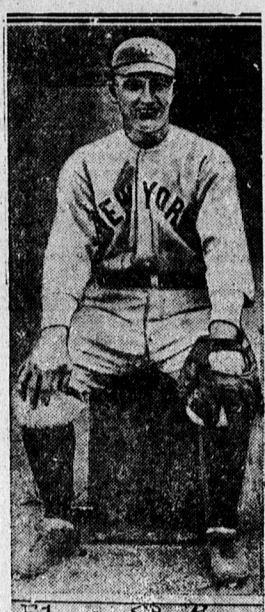
ROUND ELEVEN.

Stribling sends lefts and rights to Mike's head, Mike clinches. Stribling is excited and misses with right swing, and then sends two right's and two lefts with no return from the champion who is now in a bad way. Stribling sends right and left and another hard left to Mike's head; Stribling waiting for an opening to put over the finishing punch, but is over anxious, and loses his chance. Mike clinches as bell rings, and once again is saved.

ROUND TWELVE.

Mike comes up for the last round looking very groggy and Stribling gives him no rest, but sends both hands to Mike's head, also a left to body, knocking the champion all over the ring. Mike looks anything but a champion now. Stribling sends left to body and head right to face, playing desperately for a K. O. The end of the 12th round finds the champion holding on.
