**U. S. Builds Up Her Armed Camp In New England**

Land, Sea And Air Defences Of Northeast Area Take On New Strength In Wide Program For 1941

BOSTON, March 12.—(CP)—Regarded by many as Uncle Sam's great bulwark against invasion and as the industrial centre of American armament activity, New England's defences have received the strengthening attention of the United States War and Navy departments probably to a greater extent than any other area in the region.

The United States has been referred to as the "arsenal of democracy" and New England may be described as the front gate of the arsenal. This section of the country is vital in the production of defence materials and New England's own defences are a matter of considerable concern. Add to that the "vulnerable geographic position" of the area to attack from across the Atlantic and you have the reason why New England is "on the march."

An important point about New England defences is that the key mobilization centres for air and military forces have been selected and are now under construction or about to be constructed. It is expected that when completed these defences will not only make New England nearly impregnable; they will furnish the anchor bases from which operations against the enemy could be conducted far from New England.

Considered Plan

It is now by accident that the main concentration point for U. S. troops in New England is at Fort Belknap. Nor is it by accident that the chief air bases have been placed at Chiloque, Bangor and Manchester, or that lesser troop mobilization points are at Camp Ed Allen in northern Vermont, or that the Navy chose Quonset Point in Rhode Island for its main air base, and Squantum for its secondary base.

All these points are chosen because from them the industrial heart of New England can be covered. Draw a line from Boston, west through Worcester to Springfield, then down the Connecticut River to take in Bridgeport, Conn., then up the coast to Narragansett Bay to Providence, then back to Boston. Within these boundaries are the most vital defence industries in the region. That is the area the armed forces would defend to the bitter end. Any enemy attacking New England would have that area as its objective.

The defence of New England against any scheme of invasion or of attack short of invasion would not be static. Neither the Army nor the Navy is defence-minded. Both are committed to the theory of attack in case of war, and throughout history they have acted on that principle.

The first effort in defending this coast, therefore, would be to forestall an enemy's effort to reach the coast. The United States would, in case of need, try to beat her enemy to the island bases so helpful to naval and air operations, the Iceland-Greenland-Newfoundland line, and possibly also the Azores.

A start toward United States preparation to aid in barring the northern route of any attack against North America has been made by acquisition of Newfoundland and Bermuda bases, now being hurriedly prepared for U. S. use.

Formation of U. S. Marine Corps "bitter" landing units, fully equipped with tanks and light artillery and operating from converted destroyers, also indicates that the country would in time of war attempt to keep all advance bases in her own hands.

Ready Strategy

The United States would do this not only to prevent an enemy from reaching America but also to drive him off the seas to harass him on his own shores, to make him so uncomfortable that he would ask for peace.


