Communists In Chinese Capital

CHUNGKING, April 23—(CP)—Government reports from Manchuria today said Communist troops had quarters in clouded in the Kungshulin district east of Changchun, where the government's first army apparently was making slow progress in an effort to reach the fallen Manchurian capital. Kungshulin is 36 miles from Changchun, captured by the Communists last week. Li-Chen Chia Hsiang, acting commander of the government armies in the northeast, was scheduled to fly from Mukden to the Changchun area to study the military situation there. A newspaper correspondent said five United States newsmen, including Associated Press correspondent Tom Masterson, were safe in Changchun but that they were without freedom of action. Approximately 100 government officials there also were being detained. The capture of Changchun by the Communist forces has caused increasing uneasiness among government officials in Mukden and North China. As a direct result, the defences at Peiping and Tientsin have been tightened up considerably by the government authorities.

British Exports Show Increase

LONDON, April 23 — (CP) — Britain exported \$27,000,000 (\$600,000,000 worth of goods last month, the Board of Trade reported today. That amount is approximately 70 per cent more than the value of March 1936 exports but is about 12 per cent less than 1936 rate by volume of goods. Britain is shipping for a 75 per cent increase in volume compared with 1935. Exports of \$3,000,000 worth of manufactured goods last month were the highest by value since 1926. Biggest increase was in automobiles. Imports also rose sharply, climbing to \$103,500,000 (\$430,276,000) — an increase of \$24,100,000 against
