Freight Rate Cut To Cost \$2,000,000

OTTAWA, April 1. — Canada's proposed freight rate cut of twenty per cent. to the Maritime Provinces will involve approximately \$2,000,000 so far as the Canadian National Railways, which carry eighty per cent. of Maritime freight, is concerned.

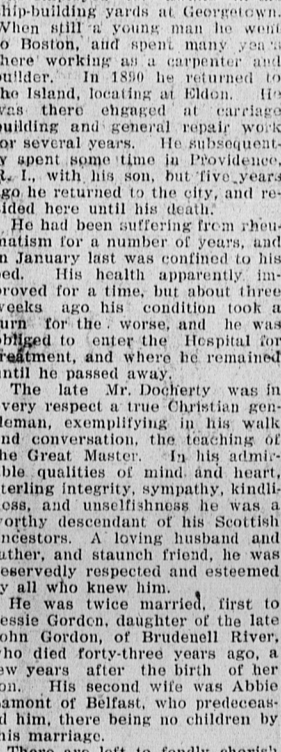
