OTTAWA, July 11—(CP)—With a convincing display of court technique, Bob Murray of Montreal yesterday dethroned Royal Wilson of Toronto as Ontario Tennis Champion. On the sun-baked clay courts of the Rideau Tennis Club, Murray won the final event of the provincial tournament 6-3, 7-5, 4-6, 6-1.

High-scoring honors of the day went to Mrs. H. L. Beer of Ottawa, a veteran of tennis tournaments, who took three titles. She won the women's singles 7-0 over Ora Davis, unranked Ottawa player, 6-2, 6-3.

With Phyllis Kyster, Ottawa, as a partner, she won the women's doubles from Ora Davis and Rejane Matte, Ottawa, 6-1, 6-4. As a climax to a brilliant day, Mrs. Beer combined with George Leclerc, Montreal, to win the mixed doubles event 6-1, 6-4 from Claire Walsh, Toronto, and Jim McDougall, Montreal.

Murray was the only double winner of the day, taking the men's doubles crown with Laird Watt, Montreal as a partner. They defeated Joe O'Hara, Ottawa, and Gordon Robinson, Niagara Falls, 6-2, 6-3, 4-6, 6-0.

Sixteen-year-old Bill Pedlar of Vancouver took the junior singles, defeating Julius Brodie, Montreal, 6-1, 6-1.
