Some Phases Of Swine Industry

Fieldman's Report

The following report was submitted by Mr. S. D. Irvine, senior fieldman, at Thursday's annual meeting of the P. E. I. Swine Breeders Association:

It is not my intention to dwell at any great length this evening on our swine industry. Principal discussion should come from our assembled swine breeders and hog producers. With your permission, however, I should like to refer briefly to one or two phases of activity within the industry during the past year which may be of some interest to you.

The past year, as we are all aware, has witnessed a distinct and continued increase in hog production and marketings, reflecting the more extensive fall breeding of sows in 1939 and again to some degree during the late winter or early spring months of 1940. Some hog owners and caretakers advise that a considerably smaller number of sows have been bred this past fall and early winter months.

Due to economic conditions generally, over the province this past fall and winter the distribution of registered boars and sows has not been particularly brisk or easy. It has been felt that many boar-owners who normally would have purchased young boars refrained from buying, and related their matured boars for another year. In addition, an occasional young undeveloped boar may have been sold privately by a breeder, which is not always in the best interests of bacon hog production as well as the knowledge made by a properly developed boar later in the season. The following breeders' stock was placed through Departmental channels from February 27th 1940 until the same date this year.

33 Registered boars (varying ages) ————	\$892.00
13 Registered sows (varying ages) ————	\$287.00
36 young sows not registered ————	\$211.50
82 head ————	\$1337.50

Young boars under breeding age were purchased to fill orders received from outside the province. An interesting order was received during the late fall from a resident of Devex, Mass., for six registered boars, eight weeks of age at \$200 dollars each, F. O. B. shipping point.

Sow Unit Policy

Under the Sow Unit Policy as jointly conducted by the Provincial and Dominion Departments of Agriculture three sow clubs were organized during the past summer at Sturgeon, Fort Augustus and in the Selkirk-St. Charles Districts. This particular policy aims at establishing carefully selected young sows of good bacon type and with a good breeding background in districts where it is felt that there is need for such. The sows are purchased outright by the club members. Prize materials comprising barley seed, while fishmeal or weaning mixture are given in lieu of cash to the contestants by the Provincial Department of Agriculture, which has had a directly beneficial influence on hog raising in the Sow Club areas. Since the introduction of this policy, nine sow clubs have been organized in the province. I believe that considerable attention should be given by the Department to the extending of this policy into additional districts where it would be felt by representatives of both Departments that a need for such exists.

The first Yorkshires Field Day sponsored by this Association was, I believe, satisfactorily received. The kind co-operation of the Charlottetown Experimental Station staff, Mr. Quigley of the firm of Davis & Fraser, as well as the active part taken by Mr. J. W. Graham, Moncton, and Mr. J. G. Lefebvre, Ottawa, all aided materially in making the field day more instructive and interesting.

Viewing our swine industry from the standpoint of production, I want to again emphasize the importance of our hog producers paying the closest attention to keeping brood sows of smooth, lengthy, well balanced bacon type and seeing to it that these sows are mated to boars strong in the qualities just mentioned. Too many of our market hogs are too heavy in the shoulder, lacking in balance and smoothness. While it is agreed that feeding can have a considerable influence on type and length in that a growing pig of fundamentally good type can be spoiled, whereas one of poor type cannot be materially improved upon by any certain feeding practice, the fact remains that a strong contributing factor to heavy shoulders, round rib lack of balance and smoothness rests with our foundation breeding stock, both pure-bred and grade.

Paid Less Attention

Briefly, first of all with references to registered breeding stock, I believe it is a fact that since the Swine Show and Sale was discontinued, and particularly since there was no central exhibition this past August, some of our pure bred swine breeders paid less attention to the breeding background and development of their young boars and

The War This Week

British diplomacy in the Balkans took a vigorous turn in the 78th week of the war. Foreign Secretary Eden's visit to Ankara with Turkish leaders, the Russian declarations of the British Minister in Bulgaria, and the flight of Sir Stafford Cripps from Moscow to confer with Mr. Eden together made a picture of concerted diplomatic action to resolve the present muddled situation in Britain's favor.

Conferences between the British Foreign Minister and his party and the highest personages of Turkey resulted in full agreement on all points regarding the Eastern Mediterranean, but authoritative information is to what that involves, was lacking. London sources, however, said one immediate result was to enable the British Minister in Sofia, George Romer, to take a strong line in his contacts with Bulgarian leaders.

As the week drew to a close Germany had yet to carry out her expected occupation of Bulgaria, and London was not overlooking the possibility that Nazi manoeuvres in southeastern Europe were a screen for action elsewhere.

Turkey and Greece were favorably impressed by the growing prospect of a British expedition to the Italians in Albania and the landing of British forces, later withdrawn after accomplishing their task on one of Italy's Dodecanese Islands.

The campaign in East Africa continued favorably, the capture of Mogadishu, capital of Italian Somaliland, being the chief achievement of the week's fighting.

In the western theatre of war, the likelihood of an early intensification of hostilities—possibly of an attempt to invade the British Isles—was read into reports reaching Wexley that the Germans are clearing the coastal area along the English Channel of civilians to a depth of 22 miles.

Glancing back 25 years:—The opening of the battle of Verdun in the last week of February, 1916, saw the advance line of the great French fortresses on the River Meuse crumble under severe artillery bombardment.

On Feb. 24 the French 2nd army under Gen. Petain undertook defence of the city. German attacks were repulsed with terrific losses on both sides. The army took Fort Douaumont Feb. 25 but the following day was driven out and the first phase of the battle ended Feb. 29 with the French holding their ground.

Buchman Charged With Activities Harmful To British

LONDON, Feb. 27.—(CP)—Charging that the activities of Dr. Frank Buchman, leader of the Oxford movement and its "moral re-arming" campaign, have been harmful to the British cause in many countries, A. P. Herbert and 50 other private members of the House of Commons tabled a motion today urging the Board of Trade to revoke the use of the title "Oxford Group."

Mr. Herbert has been member of the House for Oxford University since 1935.

The motion charged that Dr. Buchman's title to use the name Oxford was "undereved, misadvised, dangerous, especially in the United States and Canada."

It continued that Dr. Buchman's organization made no public utterance in condemnation of Hitler or other aggressors and that Buchman's activities were "occupying in the United States, a number of young British subjects who might better be employed in this country."

After the motion appeared on the order paper, Sir Robert Gwyer and six other members tabled another motion welcoming the Oxford

STILL ROLLING ALONG

The flour milling industry of Canada has a capacity to produce whatever quantity may be needed to satisfy the demands of the war. Vacancies On Bench As Economy Measure

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—(CP)—Canadians are doing less battling before the courts while the Empire battles for its life in war, according to information given the House of Commons tonight by Justice Minister Lapointe.

Col. A. J. Brooks (Can. royal) asked when Mr. Lapointe intended to fill a vacancy on the New Brunswick bench and suggested the judges there were overworked.

Mr. Lapointe said he was effecting a little economy by leaving the post vacant and added there was another vacancy in Manitoba.

"I have investigated, however, and am informed the work of the courts is not suffering at all," said Mr. Lapointe. "There has been a very great decrease in litigation in all provinces. Only last week, for the first time since Confederation, there were no cases from my own Province (Quebec), on the docket of the Supreme Court of Canada."

Earlier Mr. Lapointe said the judicial committee of the Privy Council was still functioning in London, but few litigants were going from Canada. He believed a number of cases have been postponed until after the war. He said the Supreme Court Chief Justice Lyman Duff, a member of the committee, would go to London to sit on appeals this year.

Conservative House Leader Harrison said New Brunswick courts were top-heavy. There were too many appeal judges and not enough trial judges. Savings could well be effected there.

"I hope my friend's remarks are heard in New Brunswick," Mr. Lapointe remarked.

Under the British North America Act the Provincial Governments decide on the organization of provincial courts although the judges are appointed and paid by the Federal Government.
