Military Methods Used To Handle Mob in "Hunchback"

Military methods were used in handling the 3500 players used in "The Hunchback of Notre Dame." The Universal production which is now playing at the Prince Edward Theatre. Owing to the enormous daily cost during the filming every effort was made to conserve time. The first move was the appointment of Charles Stallings, formerly air service efficiency military regulations and checked in the 3500, handed out wardrobes, dressed the players, loaded them on trucks and had them on location in fifty minutes each morning.

The handling of the mob scenes has always been a matter of grave concern to producers, but Universal solved this problem by utilizing lessons learned from the radio. Loud speaker horns were placed all over the lot, spaced twenty-five feet apart, all wired to one transmitter and this connected to a telephone on a raised platform. From this lofty perch Director Wallace Worley barked his orders.

Lon Chaney, star of the production, was on the lot each morning three and one-half hours before the remainder of the company, as he required four and one-half hours daily to don the complicated make-up that transformed him into "Quasimodo," the deformed bell-ringer of Notre Dame. Incidentally, it is interesting to note that all critics are in accord that this is the greatest piece of make-up ever done on either stage or screen. Throughout the day Chaney was forced to carry 72 pounds on his back. It was another one of his famous torture roles and one for which he later paid the penalty by spending three weeks in a private hospital. Tomorrow is your last chance to see this marvellous picture. 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Supreme Court Judgments

CANADA, PROVINCE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND IN THE SUPREME COURT

Stephen S. Hessian Plaintiff and Waldron B. Prowse Defendant

This was an action claiming \$500 damages for the conversion of a motor car. The car had in the first instance been the property of the defendant who agreed in writing with one J. W. Hickin to sell it to him upon the possession and use of the car, but the title was to remain in the defendant until full payment of the purchase price or of any obligation should therefor and that defendant should have power to take possession of the car in case of default.

The car while in the possession of Hickin was seized by the Sheriff of King's County under a Fieri Facias execution issued by a judgment creditor of Hickin, duly advertised and offered for sale at public auction. Both the plaintiff and defendant were present at the sale. The defendant bid upon the car but the plaintiff knocked down to the plaintiff at the price of \$500.00. At this time there was a balance of \$303 due to the defendant on the written contract of sale to Hickin and it was not disputed that the plaintiff was entitled to repossess the car under that contract unless by his conduct at the sale he was estopped as against the plaintiff from asserting his claim. The plaintiff's case was that he was a bona fide purchaser for value without notice of defendant's claim. It was given in evidence by the defendant and by the Sheriff of King's County that immediately prior to the sale the conditions of sale were publicly announced and that the car was sold subject to the defendant's claim. Afterwards the defendant repossessed the car under the terms of the contract of sale to Hickin and the plaintiff brought this action. At the close of the trial I had no doubt as to the defendant's right to a verdict but the defendant allowed him to submit a brief on questions of law at any time up to the 15th instant, but he has not availed himself of the opportunity. The verdict will be entered for the defendant with costs.

CANADA, PROVINCE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND, IN THE SUPREME COURT Walter P. Dawes—Appellant and James Justin Larkin—Respondent. 24th March, 1925. Judgment by Chief Justice Mathieson.

This is an appeal from the decision of His Honor Austin L. Fraser, Judge of the County Court of King's County, dismissing an information laid before the said Judge on the 25th day of August, 1924, by the appellant Customs and Excise enforcement officer of the Customs and Excise Department of Canada against James Justin Larkin (respondent herein) for that he had sold to the respondent on the 24th day of August, A.D. 1924 at Five Houses in King's County aforesaid "did have in his possession a quantity of spirits known to him to be unlawfully manufactured contrary to the provisions of Chapter 51 of the Revised Statutes of Canada and amendments thereto."

The case was heard before the said Judge at Souris in King's County aforesaid on the 29th day of August 1924 and on the same day the information was dismissed with costs. Formal objections were taken to the notice of appeal and upon the question of security for costs which in the view I take of the case it is not necessary here to decide. In this case there is little evidence to support the charge in the information, except certain alleged statements of the accused to the prosecutor that would render them inadmissible. The evidence of the accused in denial and explanation seems to me to leave the presumption of innocence still in his favor. The appeal is dismissed with costs.

Mr. A. F. McQuaid appeared as counsel for the respondent, Larkin; and Mr. M. McGuigan, for the appellant.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, March 24.—Dominion Live Stock.—There were 122 cattle, 5 sheep, 257 hogs and 1520 calves for sale on the two markets this morning. A few good butcher steers were left over from yesterday and receipts today were common dairy type cows. Only a few of the very poor ones were sold and prices were unchanged. A few lots of medium quality calves sold for 7.00 and a few better ones up to 8.00, common calves brought from 6.00 to 6.25, and the poorest lots sold down to 5.00, several lots were sold from 5.35 to 6.00, trading was slow at these prices. Hogs were scarce and prices strengthened. Mixed lots of good quality and weight sold for 14.75 and poorer lots 14.50. Selects sold yesterday up to 15.00.

OTTAWA, March 24.—(Eggs)—The market for eggs shows very little change. Receipts are not sufficiently heavy to further affect prices. In United States reports state there has been some storing, and this at prices fully 5c per dozen higher than at the commencement of storing last year. Toronto jobbing specials, 39, extras 37, firsts 25, seconds 32. Montreal jobbing extras 40, firsts 37, seconds 31, Ontario extras are costing delivered 37, firsts 34, seconds 30 to 31, Winnipeg extras jobbing 40 to 42, firsts 35 to 40, seconds 39 to 35. Other western markets unchanged. Charlottetown country points extras 28, firsts 25, seconds 29, New Brunswick country points firsts 2 50 to 2 30, St. John extras 33, firsts 30. Montreal, March 24.—Apart from a little business worked up by Canadian western oats here with the United Kingdom the export business in grain today was very quiet. There was some enquiry on spot for No. 2 feed oats at five cents per bushel under the Winnipeg May option, c.i.f. bay ports which sellers would not accept. The tone of the market for spot supplies of oats was easier at a decline of 1/2 cent per bushel, and little business was done. The demand from the United Kingdom and the continent for spring wheat flour was again of a very limited character, but there was some business accomplished with the British West Indies. There was no further change in prices. On the other hand winter wheat flour was weaker and prices were reduced another thirty cents per barrel which was attributed to the more liberal offerings from Ontario millers. A fairly active business was done in millfeed for domestic account and the tone of the market was steady. The demand for oats was limited but the undertone was steady. The volume of business in eggs was large and the tendency was firm. The tone of the cheese market remains very firm with feeder made with No. 1 white and colored ponds quoted at 22 to 22 1/2 cents per pound and No. 2 grades at 21 to 21 1/2 cents per pound. The butter market was inactive but steady. Beans were fair at \$2.70 per bushel.

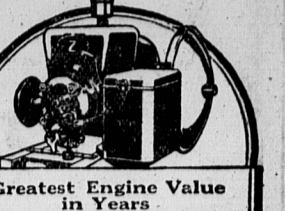

Interment was made in Canoe Cove Cemetery.
