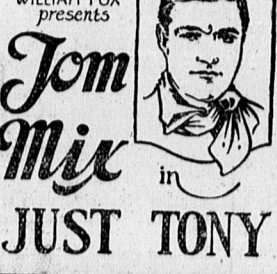

An Opportunity For The Maritime Board Of Trade

The following is taken from the Moncton Times: Moncton, N. B., August 10th, 1922. Dear Sir,—I am firmly convinced from what I see in Moncton and hear from other points that the Maritime Board of Trade is lining up for an active and aggressive campaign for Maritime Provinces interests. All local matters are going to be put aside for the present, and the big things are going to be put to the front—harbours, fisheries, agriculture, manufacturing, coal, immigration, and anything and everything that stands for the general good is going to be emphasized, and in this connection an appeal will be made to the three Governments for assistance to finance a freight expert and permanent secretary.

The St. John Board of Trade is most active and will probably send the largest delegation to Halifax that ever attended a convention. P. E. Island is reporting much enthusiasm with every assurance of a much added interest as the date draws near. I have a number of subjects ready for inspection which I hope to submit to the Board of Trade Council early next week.

Let us do a word to Board of Trade generally. Let us drop our complaints about discrimination, unfair treatment, not getting our share, etc. and get down to positive, concrete, facts, putting ourselves on record, in Halifax Sept. 11th and 12th. First knowing just what we want and then asking for it in the right spirit, and back of that a determination not only to hold what we have but to place ourselves on the map of Canada, a solid block, not superior but the equal of any in loyalty to the Empire and Dominion, in natural resources and ability to develop, in energy and character, in all that goes to make up a thrifty people.

Gentlemen, it is all in our hands. We hold the winning cards. We make governments—Federal, Local, Municipal. We make individuals and place them in positions of trust. Let us see that we make the right kind and then we can expect the right results. Come to Halifax September 11th and 12th, and do your share toward making those Maritime Provinces the very best in Canada.

CREW'S PETS FROM SMALL MENAGERIE

BALTIMORE, Md., Aug. 16.—The British steamship Dacre Castle from India and China has docked here with the oddest assortment of pets ever seen in Baltimore. The ship is direct from Calcutta but the animals were picked up in the various ports that it touched during a six months' in the Orient. The menagerie includes a mongoose several species of monkeys, a sun rat and a chameleon. All the animals have been tamed. The mongoose perhaps has gained the affection of the crew more fully than the others through an escapade that its master Lawrence Siggs, wireless operator, describes as "a hair raiser." A cobra one of the deadliest snakes was loaded into the ship with some rubber and escaped to the captain's cabin. The little mongoose sniffing its way about found the intruder and the "fur flow." 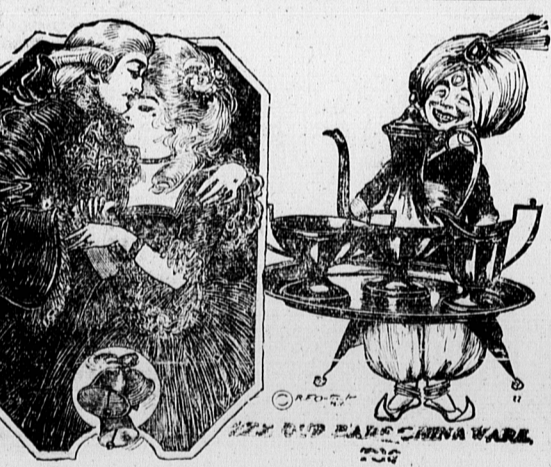
