Mt. Allison and Dalhousie Universities met in a debating contest in Halifax recently and the latter won out by one point. The subject was "That free trade in natural products between Canada and the United States would be beneficial to Canada." This was carried. On the Mt. Allison team was one Prince Edward Island boy; A. N. Knight, Alberton.

That the royal name will be more popular in future in the Indian Reserve is evidenced by the fact that the other day a Micmac baby boy was brought to the city, and christened George, in order that he might have a share in the gift to the King from the loyal Georges of the Empire.

At the recent annual meeting of the Home Mission committee of the Presbyterian Church in the Maritime Provinces forty-five applications were received from students for work in the mission fields during the coming summer. The majority of the students applying were from Cape Breton, Pictou County, N. S., and Prince Edward Island. Rev. T. F. Fullerton, City, was in attendance at this meeting. J. C. McDonald and D. McVicar, were appointed catechists from this province under the oversight of the committee.

The funeral of the late John T. Peardon, City, who died Thursday night, and not Friday morning as incorrectly reported, was held Saturday afternoon at 3.30 from his late residence, Spring Park, to the People's Cemetery where interment was made. A large attendance testified to the esteem in which the deceased was held and further expressions of sympathy were presented in the form of beautiful floral offerings. The services at the house and grave were conducted by Revs. Wm. Harrison and H. E. Thomas. The pall-bearers from the Masonic fraternity, under whose auspices the funeral was held, were John McNevin, George J. Lane, L. C. Worthy and W. P. Doull.

The concert held in the B. I. S. hall at Emerald on St. Patrick's was one of the most successful ever held in the village. The oration delivered by the Rev. P. C. Gauthier was a masterpiece of its kind. It was a glowing tribute to the Irish and their patron saint, couched in the eloquent language for which Fr. Gauthier is well known. Solos by Misses Clark, Murphy and Gorman were encored with a vigor that showed how well they were received. Miss Gorman especially pleasing the audience by her efforts. Miss Clarke was at disadvantage in not being able to secure an accompanist. Nevertheless this number of the program was regarded by many as being second to none. Of the male contingent Messrs. Flood and Monaghan were the "stars" while the "old reliable" M. T. T. Iambe, ably sustained his reputation. A duet by Leonard MacDonald and Gerald McCarthy completed this part of the program. A declamation by Miss Ella MacMahon reflected considerable credit on her histrionic abilities, while one by Miss Clarke was also well received. Music of a high order was furnished by Jerome Monaghan and his sister Miss Lena Monaghan. The concluding, and in the opinion of many, the crowning part of the entertainment was a dialogue presented by the Debating Club. In this the performances of Miss Deighan as "New Moon" and of Leonard MacDonald as an amateur wit, and Joseph MacDonald as an elderly gentleman, deserve special notice. The others taking part were Bennet Deighan, Neil Croken, Sinus MacDonald and Gerald McCarthy. The song "Nothing too Good for the Irish" was acceptably rendered by Leonard MacDonald and Gerald McCarthy. The National Anthem was then sung, and the audience dispersed.
