Thirty Bodies Have Been Recovered

(Canadian Press) QUEBEC, Dec. 19.—Thirty and not thirty-six bodies have been recovered from the ruins of the Hospice St. Charles. This was the sensational discovery made yesterday when the bodies were being taken out for the funeral and the fact was made known at noon today by Hubert Moisan, proprietor of the morgue. This does not, however, reduce the extent of loss of life in the catastrophe.

According to an estimate made last Thursday by the Rev. Mother Superior, four children were missing, as it was then thought that there were thirty-six of these at the morgue. It was taken for granted that the bodies of eighteen children were still lying among the debris of the destroyed wing of the hospice. It is to be answered next meeting that the bodies of twenty-four of the unfortunate victims still remain to be found in the debris.
