DISCUSSED NATURE OF ASSOCIATION

Dr. E.M. Best, General Staff Secretary of The Y. M. C. A. Addressed Board of Directors And Y's Men's Club.

A very interesting address on the nature, ideals and purposes of the Y. M. C. A. was given last evening by Dr. E. M. Best, Toronto, General Secretary of the Nation Council of Y. M. C. A. before the Y's Men's Club and the board of directors of the local association at the first meeting of the former body held this fall.

Mr. T. W. Bentley was in the chair. A large number of visitors were present. Dr. E. M. Best announced his subject as "The Nature of the Y. M. C. A." It had been pointed out often that the Association had no central unity, but Dr. Best believed this to be untrue. The external world had undergone very serious changes in the last 50 years, he said, but even more striking changes which the thinking of the people had undergone. The ideals of the Y. M. C. A. have changed radically with respect to religion. The miraculous elements in older days had been emphasized, but in the modern world there had been a tremendous emphasis placed on the humanity of Christ as well as the divinity. In purely human terms, the manhood and character of Jesus was the ideal of what man should attain. This shift had caused Jesus to be regarded differently.

In this work the Y. M. C. A. had played an unconscious part. From the first the interest in social and physical in addition to the spiritual life had far reaching consequences, and had brought into being a series of activities which had not up to that time been regarded as part of the spiritual. The new attitude of including the physical and intellectual aspects in the religious life along with the spiritual had been responsible for the adoption of the triangle as an association symbol.

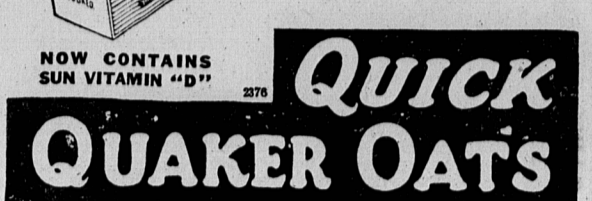
A four-fold programme of spiritual, intellectual, social, and physical had since been developed. The Y. M. C. A. is still developing ideas. Health, including the perfect functioning of mind and body was the ideal for every child that comes into the world. The ideal of discovering new truth represented a different attitude toward the subject of truth. A new and more sensitive attitude was being developed toward beauty. The appreciation of the beauty in nature was discovered in the romantic movement of the last century. The appreciation of the Japanese for things of beauty was very highly developed, and very sensitive. The beauty of art in which the beauty of the world is re-created was also worthy of development.

The ideals of goodness as represented in honesty, truthfulness, courage, fidelity of character, and of efficiency, so necessary in the modern world, where service is in demand is being upheld. The ideal was a goal which none had attained except Jesus but man must attempt to reach the goal. There was more involved than that had already been outlined. Dr. Best stated, Christianity demanded more than self-realization. Voluntary self-sacrifice as exemplified in the Cross was also a necessity. The world needed to be saved from ignorance and stupidity, common to all, from poverty and misery, from sickness and disease, from fear and hate, from lust and cruelty, from selfishness and greed. The sanctification of resources for the service and salvation of mankind was the doctrine which the Y. M. C. A. is spreading, the speaker stated in conclusion.

TORONTO, Sept. 10.—(C.P.)—Farm implement manufacturers have sold more products and obtained more prospects during this year's Canadian National Exhibition than in 1931, according to leading machinery manufacturers. In one instance, sales increases have reached 100 per cent with prospects touching a 500 per cent advance. "It does your heart good to talk to these farmers," said J. J.
