YESTERDAY the strange actions of a man who was praying and preaching in the streets, kneeling in the snow and otherwise attracting attention, brought him to the notice of the police who took charge of him. He has at various times shown signs of mild and harmless insanity and has received treatment on a previous occasion at Falconwood Hospital. He will be detained at the Police station till it is decided what shall be done with him.

A TELEGRAM received here announces the untimely death of Mrs. R. A. Mason at Edmonton, Alta. The deceased was a daughter of Neil Shaw, proprietor of Shaw hotel, Beasley Beach, and a telegram received a few days ago stated that she was seriously ill. Her parents Mr and Mrs Shaw left Sunday night for Edmonton, and are still on board the Minto in the ice off Cape Bear. The late Mrs. Mason formerly lived with her husband on the Wright farm— which they bought—St Peter's Road. Last spring they sold their place and went West. The death of Mrs. Mason will be learned with deepest regret, and her husband, parents and other relatives will have the sincere sympathy of all.

AUGUSTUS McINNIS a well known man who has for some months been an inmate of the Falconwood Hospital left the institution at 5 o'clock Monday morning, clad only in his underclothes. He belonged to Earncliffe, fully fifteen miles from Charlottetown, via the ice. He was traced as far as Mr. Corey's, on the other side of the river. By Mr Corey, he was driven to his home, apparently little the worse of his trip. Not even his ears were frozen though the weather was bitterly cold. He was coming in this week to take him home, and the patient probably imagined that they were keeping him longer at the institution than they had a right to. When he turned up at Mr. Corey's he was completely clothed although it is not known where he procured the garments.
