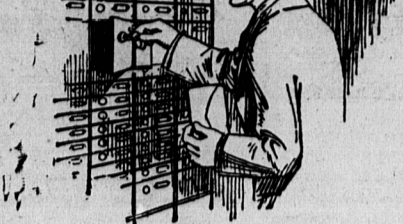

#### THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)  
MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 17.—(Produce)—Produce markets here today were about steady on butter, a little firmer on cheese, irregular on eggs on unchanged on potatoes. The butter market was holding around the level for carlots of eastern townships no. 1 pasteurized. Small lots to retailers were 23c-24c for solids and 24-25c for prints. Receipts were 655 boxes.

The cheese market was 12 3/4c to 12 7/8c for Ontario and 12 1/4c to 12 3/8c for Quebec, asking prices. These quotations were slightly higher than at the close last week. Receipts were 2,771 boxes. Irregularly developed on the egg market. On the recent advance owing to expected falling off in supplies, dealers bought plentifully; then, receipts did not go down quite as much as expected and some firsts and seconds, in carlots, sold today at low as 22c for firsts and 20c for seconds. The general spot market appeared to be 27-28c for extras, 23c for firsts and 21c for seconds, with British Columbia one cent higher.

The potato market was 50c for 80 lb. bags, new Montreal district potatoes.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 17.—(Eggs)—Although some further price advances on eggs have been reported over the weekend the general trend on most of the larger markets is for values to hold steady at the recent advances.

TORONTO—This egg market is steady today. Dealers are quoting producers and country shippers for ungraded eggs extras 23-24, firsts 20-21, second 16. Graded shipments from Country points are selling to wholesalers at extras 26, firsts 23, seconds 18.

MONTREAL—Egg receipts here today were 1,833 cases as compared with 751 cases for the corresponding day last year. The market is a little on the dull side. A car of western eggs has been sold at extras 27, firsts 22, seconds 20, delivered. Dealers are quoting for local ungraded shipments extras 25-25, firsts 22-23, seconds 18-19.

WINNIPEG—Receipts of eggs on all principal markets throughout Manitoba and Saskatchewan continue to fall off and some further price advances have taken place. Dealers here are quoting producers and country shippers for ungraded eggs extras 18, firsts 16, seconds 15 delivered, cases returned.

EDMONTON—A firm egg market is being experienced both here and at Calgary with a further decline in receipts. At Calgary dealers are now quoting producers for eggs extras 16-17, firsts 13-14, seconds 19-20.

VANCOUVER—This egg market is in a firm position with receipts continuing to drop off. Demand is also good. Producers are receiving for eggs at the farm extras 21-22, firsts 18-20, pullet extras 16-18.

## Ontario Liberals Exchange Compliments

### Heated Verbal Battle In Progress Between Hon. W. E.N. Sinclair, Liberal House Leader, And Senator Hardy President Of Ontario Liberal Association.

TORONTO, Aug. 16.—In a letter to Senator Arthur G. Hardy, President of the Ontario Liberal Association, and handed to the press, W. E. N. Sinclair, K. C., leader of the Liberal Opposition in the Ontario Legislature, declares the Senator's charge "on the matter of lack of energy" as "regard to hostility to the Liberal Association" fall entirely. Mr. Sinclair's letter is in reply to statements of Senator Hardy, published August 7, that Mr. Sinclair's attitude was "simply to embarrass Mitchell F. Hepburn, M. P., Ontario Liberal leader, and 'to arrogate to himself the part of spokesman during our leader's illness.'"

In his letter to the Senator Mr. Sinclair says "Just why my discussion of hydro affairs and the Beauharnois scandal should so arouse your ire as to cause you to make such an unjust attack on me, I am at a loss to know. If you attacked my views, I could understand, but when you take my statement and devote your whole effort against me personally, without even discussing the issues raised by me, it seems to me the public must be wondering why you have done so."

#### ASKS SENATOR HARDY ONE

Further on in the letter Mr. Sinclair proceeds "and while writing you, I propose to ask you one pertinent question which can be answered by 'yes' or 'no' and the question is this—have you at any time had any part in any manner directly, or indirectly, in any of the negotiations with anyone leading up to or relating to the Beauharnois order in council passed by the late Federal Government, and which was recently revoked and replaced by legislation by the present Government?"

Mr. Sinclair says the Senator's complaint about the Liberal leader's "lack of energy for seven and a half years while acting as leader" came rather late. "It was never communicated to me by you during my leadership," the letter goes on. "I could not get you to call a convention during all that time, until after the Federal party defeat." Mr. Sinclair said the Senator wrote to him after the last provincial election congratulating him on the fight he had put up and also wrote to Harry Johnson, secretary of the Liberal Association, stating he trusted "our people would be most careful not to criticize me (Mr. Sinclair) and that I did good work and was not to be blamed for the debacle."

"Your reference to my desire for revenge against the Liberal Convention is ill advised," continued the letter. "You say I was repudiated by the Convention. As I recall it I declined to be a candidate. I led the Liberals in the House during the last session, following that convention, and have received warm praise from Liberals ever since, for my work there."

Regarding Senator Hardy's criticism of his various statements as published in the press Mr. Sinclair remarks, "If after twenty years of public life, I am not capable of forming an opinion, it would be a strange thing."
