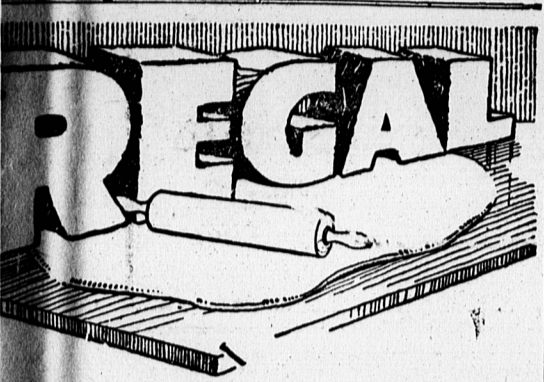

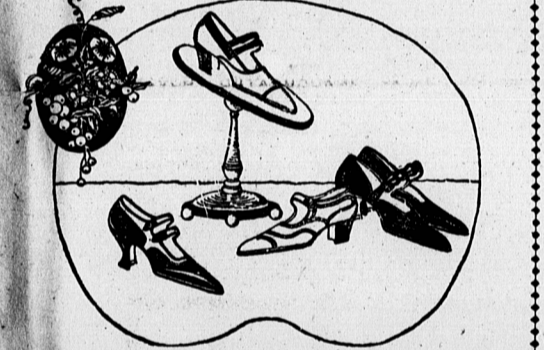

**HOME FROM SASK.**—Mr. J.P. McIsaac, formerly of Cardigan, and now of Saskatchewan, who has been visiting his former home in Cardigan since the middle of December, leaves this morning on return. Mr. McIsaac has been absent from the province for the past fourteen years. He is an extensive farmer in Saskatchewan where he has 1,000 acres under cultivation, most of it under wheat, but also growing sufficient hay and oats for his stock which usually runs to as many as 300 head of cattle and 40 horses. He is especially interested in horses and owns one of the best stallions in the west, a Belgian stallion weighing 2,200 pounds. At the International Fair in Chicago last year his neighbor, Mr. J. A. Strange, captured the championship with a Belgian draft mare weighing around 2,200. The community in which he lives is almost entirely made up of Americans and the favorite horses among them all are Belgian stock, most of them imported before the war. The cattle, principally Herefords and Short-horns, are not housed in winter, but have open shelters to run in and are fed in the open, the hay being scattered on the snow. Mr. McIsaac thinks there has been little improvement in the cattle and horses in the vicinity of Cardigan since he left here, but speaks very highly of the Clydesdales and Percherons owned by the Department of Agriculture. He strongly recommends the using of the best sires for the improvement of stock. He thinks the best horses for this country are the Belgian breeds of draft horses, while a cross between a Clydesdale and a Belgian makes an excellent work horse.
