It is mentioned that the late Nicholas Flood Davin, just before his death had completed a novel which will now shortly be published. It is entitled Dorsal Ray, and is said to deal with incidents of his own early life and career.

According to Ford's cable letter Kruger recently in an interview admitted that the Boers would not submit to any arbitration award unless it secured the independence of the two republics. They want arbitration, but will only accept the result if it accords with their views.

Germany like France has a big deficit this year, partly owing to the industrial and commercial depression there. The deficit totals \$35,000,000, and this is exclusive of the cost of the military expedition to China which was \$38,000,000 and has been added to the debt.

The special mining commissioner of the London Economist estimates the yield of Canadian gold mines last year as follows: Ontario 18,767 ounces; Nova Scotia 30,300; British Columbia 231,089; the Yukon 1,500,000 ounces, a total of 1,780,000 ounces which at \$18 per ounce would be worth \$32,040,000.

The United States pension rolls contain 997,735 names—almost a million. Only 5,604 of these were added on account of the war with Spain. No fewer than 38,000 claims were added within the year on account of the War of the Rebellion which closed 37 years ago. Some 43,000 names are dropped from the roll yearly on account of death and other causes, but still the pension list grows.

The new Australian tariff hits some lines but not all of Canadian trade pretty hard. For instance the new flour duty of 60 cents per 100 lbs., or \$1.20 per barrel, is practically prohibitory unless in case of a harvest failure in Australia. Already a large order for Canadian flour has been cancelled. Reapers and binders are still on the free list, however. Paper is made to bear a pound per ton duty, but pulp is free. The Australian ministers make the excuse that with inter-state trade made free there comes the necessity of raising the duties against the outside world. And before the Commonwealth was established, of the six States now included only one had a free trade tariff, while three had high revenue tariffs and two were squarely protectionists.

The Panama Canal enterprise has taken on a new aspect by the Government of Nicaragua terminating the concession made to the United States authorising the latter to construct and operate a canal through Nicaraguan territory. There were two treaties, one made in 1857 and the other in 1870. As nothing has been done

toward the construction of the canal for which the concession was granted and as Uncle Sam has been considering whether or not to abandon it and purchase the unfinished Panama canal, Nicaragua has had some reason to lose patience. The termination of the concession has also an important bearing on the new treaty between Britain and the United States now awaiting ratification by the Washington Senate.

Sergeant Hurdis McLean, now of the South African Constabulary and formerly of this City, in a private letter to Mr. C. D. Rankin, mentions the following shocking instance of Boer treachery. He writes:

The Boers are still up to their treachery. They did a very dirty trick under the white flag a couple of weeks ago at one of our posts below Heidelberg. Two of them came in under a white flag and a Corporal went out to meet them, as they are not allowed to come inside the post lines without being blind-folded. They told him they wanted to see the officer in command and the officer, Capt. Myers, went out and after a few minutes conversation they parted, the captain starting back to the post and they going the other way. After going a short distance they turned and shot him in the back, killing him and then galloped away.

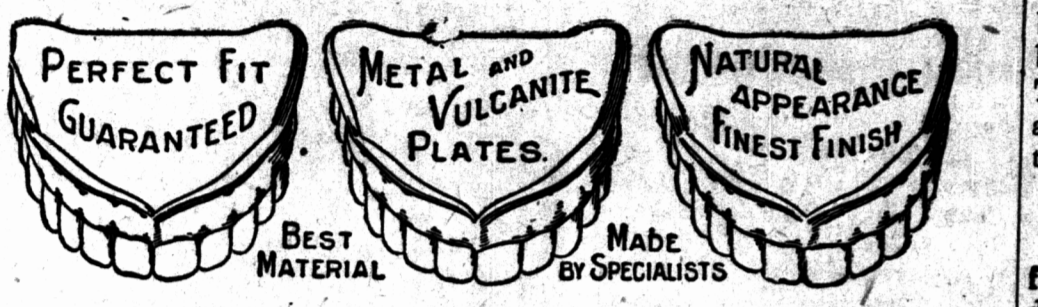

## More Storms Brewing
