GIRL HELPED ROB HER OWN HOME HE SAYS

BOSTON, Sept. 30—Gordon H. Rogers, thought to be a member of a well-known New York family, was arrested yesterday afternoon charged with twice robbing the safe of Nathan Jacobs of 329 Newbury Street, Back Bay, of jewelry and other articles valued at \$2000.

The young man, although admitting that he secured the stolen articles from the safe, made the startling statement that he did not break into the house, but that he was brought in by Miss Vivian Jacobs, Mr. Jacobs' own daughter, who had the safe opened for him by an expert.

FATHER DENIES.

Mr. Jacobs denies this. He is certain that his daughter had nothing to do with the two safe robberies.

Mr. Jacobs was amazed at the man's story. He had given orders to the police to use every effort to have the robber of his safe traced, and was pleased to hear yesterday that the police had succeeded in making an arrest. He felt certain that the safe opening was the work of professionalists. When the police repeated the story told by the young man to him he was overcome by the shock. He felt certain, however, that it was absolutely untrue, so far as his daughter was concerned. The police sympathized deeply with him, but they sought to investigate the story told by Rogers. To support it they found a safe expert who admits having opened the safe and also furnished the combination to it.

And this safe expert declares that it was to a woman that he gave the combination, and that it was a woman who first had him open the safe. Yet to support Mr. Jacobs' exoneration of his daughter, there is the fact that the police have made but one arrest in the case.

Rogers gave a fictitious address in Beachmont when he was booked at police headquarters, but it is said by the police that his right name is Randall and that he is the son of a wealthy family in New York city who spend their winters in Bermuda.

Rogers made his confession when he was taken after he had returned from a motorcycle ride to his lodgings near the Winthrop Beach station.

Rogers told the police that he had made a visit previous to Sept. 2 to the house, Aug. 21, and had taken \$170 out of the safe. The Jacobs family were spending the summer at Winthrop and the Back Bay residence was closed.

He and Miss Jacobs, he said, came to Boston and went to the house and took the money. Then on Sept. 3 they arrived shortly before 2 o'clock

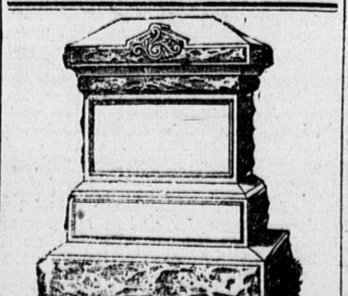

WANTED JEWELRY.

She whispered to Rogers and Rogers then said to Manager Hogan that he would like to have the safe opened sure before 5 o'clock as he wanted to get some jewelry for a party.

Manager Hogan sent Herbert Berry of Hyde Park to open the safe. When Berry arrived at the house in answer to his ring Rogers opened the door. He showed Berry to the room where the safe was kept, Rogers said. He explained that he had the combination, but could not open the safe as it seemed as if the slugs were caught.

Berry quickly opened the safe, Rogers declared. He then asked how much the bill would be and Berry explained that Manager Hogan would send a bill the next day.

Berry then left the young man, who remained at the house. The next morning Rogers called on Manager Hogan and asked what the bill was as he wanted to pay it. He was told that there would be no bill as Jacobs had bought the safe from his company.

Soon after the safe expert had left Rogers called a taxicab and was driven to the store of the Bigelow Kennard company on West street, but it was closed. Rogers then discharged the taxicab and entered a drug store. When next he met the young woman the police are not certain, unless it was in Winthrop.

It developed yesterday why the young couple were so anxious that the safe should be opened before 5 o'clock was that the Jacobs family were liable to return, as they were at the aviation meet at Atlantic. When the family returned they found the house had been ransacked and that the silverware and the valuables were strewn about the place.

POLICE NOTIFIED.

A window was left open so that the family thought burglars had been in the house. The police were notified and Inspector Conroy and Pierce were placed upon the case. They found upon investigating that the job looked as if it had been done by some one familiar with the house. They made such a report to Jacobs, but he could not understand why any one should know the combination to the safe.

Jacobs had a burglary insurance policy in the Fidelity Casualty Company of 114 Water street and he at once notified the company. The company was not satisfied that the job was the work of burglars so the Pinkerton detectives were placed upon the case. After considerable work, Miss Jacobs was trailed by the detectives, who found that she had taken a taxicab with a young man at Rowe's wharf.

They located the chauffeur who gave them the first real tip in the case. As a result they located Mr. Hogan and he told them the story of how the couple had come to have the safe opened.

SHE LED TO ROGERS.

The next trail was to find the young man, and by watching Miss Jacobs the police soon discovered that Rogers was the young man seen mostly in her company. The officers watched Rogers and learned that he had received a letter from his mother in New York asking him to come home and pay her a visit before the family went to Bermuda for the winter.

Several days ago Inspector Conroy was about to arrest young Rogers, who went away. He returned yesterday and had just returned from a motorcycle ride when the officers who were secreted near the Winthrop Beach station saw him go into a hotel nearby and out the back way. The officers entered the lodging house and confronted Rogers who, when he saw the chauffeur, was dazed for a moment.

SHOWED WARRANT. The officers told him they had a warrant for his arrest charging him with the break at the Jacobs house. Rogers then made a clean breast of the whole affair. He stated that he had pawned some of the jewelry for \$400 in New York and that the rest of the valuables were in New York.

He was then brought to headquarters, where he was met by John Quinn, member of the Governor's Council, who had a long conversation with him. Mr. Jacobs was notified by Inspector Conroy of the arrest of Rogers and told what Rogers said about Jacobs' daughter being implicated.

As a result of the interview between Inspector Conroy no further arrests were made. Rogers, after his conference with his attorney, was in bad shape.

He was on the verge of breaking down when Inspector Conroy took him to the city prison. He will be arraigned in court this morning, charged with breaking and entering the Jacobs house.

Rogers, whose right name is said to be Randall, is but 21 years old and was fashionably dressed and is quite good looking. Miss Jacobs is said to be about his age and is described as being good looking and dresses in fashionable style.
