TORONTO, Aug. 25 - (CP) - Leyland Motors of Leyland, Lancashire, England, today announced organization of a new Canadian company to be known as Leyland Motors (Canada) Limited. Hundreds more have their fare and passports ready but are waiting for a ship to escape the growing unemployment here. RAT POISON SPREAD SWIFT CURRENT, Sask. - (CP) - A Winnipeg rat exterminating firm spread 300 pounds of rat poison in July in Swift Current's rat breeding grounds. It was estimated all but 25 rodents were killed.
