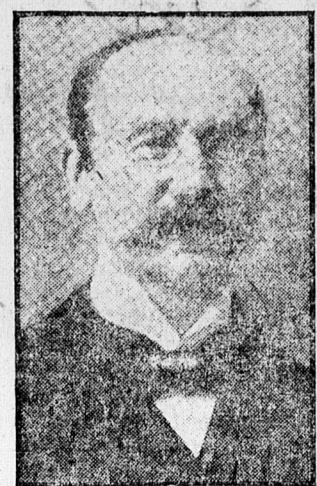

ELOQUENT SERMON BY REV. DR. CAMPBELL

ST. JOHN, March 29.—Rev. Dr. Dr. George M. Campbell, secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, recently preached an eloquent sermon in the tenary church on Canadian Citizenship in its making.

He referred to the present being a critical time in Canadian history, the nation being in transition from vastness to greatness. He dwelt at length on the wonderful changes in Canada in a generation, and pointed out that the thoughts of the world and its peoples were now turned towards the dominion. He spoke also of the serious problem of developing a great nation with mixed multitude in citizenship.

He referred to objections made by Canada's competitors that the territory was too long for its habitable width and that the climate was too severe. He quoted Dr. Draper to the effect that no nation was long lived whose territory lay North and South, and pointed out that Canada lay East and West and all in one zone. With regard to climate, he instanced the wheat growing possibilities of the country, and spoke of it also as developing resourcefulness and strength.

CIRCLED GLOBE ALONE

NEW YORK, March 30.—Mrs. Willifred Sercomb of Minneapolis, who spent three years travelling in many countries in order to acquire a knowledge of the world, has returned to this city. She journeyed to Singapore with friends, but during the remainder of her tour around the world she travelled alone. "I have satisfied myself that in this need have no fear in travelling alone," she said. "There was only one place where I felt the slightest trepidation, and that was in India, where railroad travel is not of the best. The thought that I was to travel through India with only Indian servants astounded those I met in Calcutta."

"I was dragged out to undertake the journey alone, and a Chicago couple insisted on going along with me on the railroad journey from Calcutta to Benares. I came through alone without trouble."

NECK BROKEN STILL LIVES.

DIGBY, N. S., March 29.—Daniel Campbell, a highly respected farmer here, fell from his hay loft last evening, breaking his neck and receiving a severe scalp wound. He still lives, however, in an unconscious condition, but there are but little hopes of his recovery. Mr. Campbell is 76 years of age.

CONDITIONS IN INDIA WERE EXAGGERATED.

NEW YORK, March 29.—Among the passengers on the White Star liner Baltic, which arrived here Saturday evening, were Sir Andrew Fraser, formerly Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, India and Lady Fraser. Sir Andrew Fraser was in the Indian service for thirty-seven years. Two attempts have been made on his life, the last being in November when a young revolutionist attempted to shoot him. B. A. Barker, an American and Secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association in Bengal, saved Sir Andrew. For this Mr. Barker was decorated by the British Government.

Speaking of conditions in India, Sir Andrew said that, in spite of the sensational stories that had gone out from that country, there would be no general uprising. "It is quite true," he said, "that there is a spirit of unrest there, but there is no danger of a second Indian mutiny. The revolutionist element is small, and the feeling against present conditions rather undefined. Of course, the economic conditions in India are not conducive to a general quiet. The price of articles of necessity and general use have gone up, while the wages have stood still. The remedy? I suppose there will have to be a period of waiting until affairs adjust themselves."
