**Death Toll 11 In Bermuda Crash**

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Nov. 8. (CP) — The death toll in the crash off here Thursday of a United States B-29 Superfortress rose to 11 today with the death in hospital of Capt. Cleo S. Maddox of Kokomo, Ind.

Maddox was one of three survivors. Earlier reports said he suffered only minor injuries. Kindley Field officials said the big plane had turned back from a weather observation flight when one of its engines failed. Losing altitude, it could not land because another aircraft blocked the runway and it crashed into the sea a mile offshore.
