They left yesterday for Boston on the S.S. Halifax.

A horticultural curiosity in the shape of a bunch of eleven cabbages growing on one stalk was shown The Guardian yesterday. The cabbages, notwithstanding the struggle for existence within such narrow bounds, were all well formed and healthy. This curiosity was grown in the garden of J. J. Gay & Sons, Charlottetown, and is now on exhibition in the market.

The militia orders announce the results of the artillery competitions held during the summer in all parts of Canada, and including the shooting of each battery at Petawawa. There were twenty-six batteries competing in the field battery competition. The first prize for efficiency, the Governor-General's cup and the Earl of Strathbrooke cup, was won by the 2nd and field battery of Ottawa, with 550 points. The batteries next in order were the 17th Sydney, 533 points; 2nd Sherbrooke, 494 points; 4th Hamilton, 472 points; 15th Winnipeg, 468 points; 19th Moncton, 463 points. The general efficiency competition is divided into two divisions, one for battery gun practice and the other for efficiency in personnel. For gun practice the Sydney battery was first with 290 points; the Ottawa second battery, 2nd with 277, and the 4th Hamilton battery, third, with 252 points. In the personnel appearance competition, the 2nd battery won with 273 points; 2nd and Sherbrooke, 2nd, with 272 points and the 3rd Montreal 3rd, score 266. In the heavy artillery series the 4th Prince Edward Island battery was first, score 594. The 3rd Prince Edward Island battery was second, score 530. The 2nd Montreal battery, third, score 482.8 and the Coburg battery fourth, 404.2.

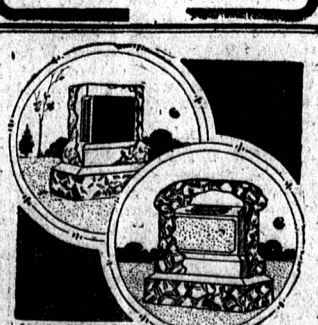
