### Meeting Held In Interests of Athletics

There was a very good attendance at the meeting in the City Hall last evening, considering the short previous notice to take into consideration the matter of creating a new athletic club.

Mr. Yeo presided and after explaining the object of the gathering reviewed the athletic history of the past few years, pointing out the necessity of wider activity, the promotion of baseball and other games among school boys and juniors and the renewal of field and track activities. He stated that many prominent citizens had pledged their support in this end.

Other speakers were Coun. Miller who expressed his support and offered a cup for a relay race for boys under 18 years of age at the 12th of July gathering; George L. Prowse who has offered medals for all school sports to be held shortly; F. Doyle, and James Coyle, both of whom offered timely suggestions, one of which was that several athletic events should be featured at the regular ball games, James McEchern, and A. F. Campbell, who urged the advisability of relay races.

It was decided to hold a series of athletic meets at which the boys and juniors will get every encouragement. For the sports on July 12th a program was decided on as follows:

- 100 yards dash (18 years and under)
- Half mile bike.
- Pole vault (18 years and under)
- Relay race, (18 years and under)
- 220 yards run (open)
- Half mile run (open)

Following these sports athletic gatherings will be held every week till the close of the season. Beginning on Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock old athletes will be present at the track to encourage and instruct the boys.

The suggestion was made that a series of events be held once yearly to determine the provincial all-around champion. That a brass tablet be erected in some public building in the name of the champion. Each year the name of the new man winning this honor should find a place on the tablet and this it was believed would have a splendid effect in stimulating boys to compete in many sports.

**Summerside vs Kensington Athletic Meet**

LONDON, Ont., July 5.—Three nurses, representing the staff of nurses at the Speedwell Hospital, Guelph, appeared before the G.W. Y.A. here, and expressed resentment at the strike story which had appeared in many newspapers. 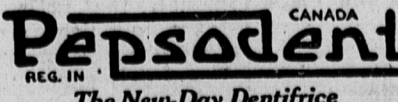
