DIAMOND RINGS German Names Are Barred



LONDON, Sept. 12.—The British Administration in Tanganyika Territory (ex-German East Africa) has substituted native names for the German names of certain districts and towns. The following changes have been made: Welhelmsdal district is now called Usambara district and Welhelmsdal town Lushoto. Bismarckburg district, adjoining the southeast end of Lake Tanganyika, is renamed Utiya, and the port of Bismarckburg on the lake Kasanga, Langenburg district, between Tanganyika and Nyasa, is now Runwe, and the town of New Langenburg, Tukuvi. Wiedhafen, on Nyasa, is renamed Manda.

CROP REPORT

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts shown. The map overleaf indicates the approximate extent of the districts mentioned.

PRARIE PROVINCES: summary of reports indicate wheat grading yielding better than anticipated, particularly in Saskatchewan. Last year's wheat graded about \$2 per bushel, but this will be reduced later. Latest estimate places wheat at 275,000,000 compared with 234,000,000 bushels last year. Quality of oats expected to be inferior to last years in all provinces. Edmonton District weather excellent for harvesting. Cutting with the exception of green feed, nearly completed. Yield and sample up to expectations. Crops now safe from any serious damage from frost. Calgary District, harvesting conditions continue satisfactory and threshing fairly general east and south where yield is averaging about as estimated. In the north 80 per cent of the cutting is done, threshing just starting. Lethbridge District, threshing general, but short crop in some districts to 35 bushels in others. Total promises about half last years shipments. Wheat grading well. Regina District, 80 per cent cutting completed, threshing general within week. General yield average. Lethbridge District, harvesting conditions satisfactory. Saskatchewan District, cutting about finished, threshing general. Early returns indicate average wheat yield of about 15 bushels. Winnipeg District, cutting practically concluded, threshing and marketing proceeding rapidly. Inspections for 3 days over holiday 1,821 cars of which 1,495 were new wheat.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC: Cereal crops are all harvested and threshing has commenced. Yield will be light. Root crops, especially potatoes, have improved considerably during the last week or so. Grass pasture also has greatly benefited by recent rains.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO: Harvesting is completed and threshing in progress. In some districts crops fairly good, other districts below average. Fall and spring wheat of poor quality and much below average. Rye and oat crops only fair average, but the heavy yield of corn will result in a greater amount of ensilage. Root crops in good condition with exception of potatoes. Apple crop light about 50 per cent normal, other fruits good. Rain still needed although condition have been helped by some showers. Fall ploughing is well under way.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA: Interior weather favourable, rain affecting grains in fields in coast district but good average yield still looked for. Roots developing satisfactorily. Quality may be affected in Fraser Valley by excessive moisture. Reports now indicate potato crop will not exceed 70 per cent of normal. Okanagan fruits moving freely and apple crop from Valley estimated 4,000 cars, exceeding 1919 tonnage. Quality good.

Wilhelm Hedged in by Barbed Wire and his Mails Censored by Dutch Authorities Because of Activity of German Adherents

BERLIN, Sept. 12.—If the former Kaiser is hedged in by barbed wire and his mail is censored by Dutch authorities, he has only his foot friends in Germany to thank, according to the Morgenpost, which says: "The Kaiser's loyal adherents cannot let a day pass without sending all sorts of telegrams, letters, greetings, congratulations and messages calculated to lead him to suppose that nothing has changed in Germany. Streams of reply telegrams have been coming from Doorn, as if real Kaiser were residing in Holland and was sending communications to his subjects in Germany. "These idle gestures proved not to be so harmless as appeared, and it was necessary to stop them in order to make the Kaiser realize that he is no longer Kaiser."
