Council Meets With Committee To Plan Opening Of Rink

A meeting of the Mayor and Council and the Building Committee of the Community Welfare League was held in the Council Chambers, Georgetown, on Friday, January 6. Mayor P. L. Boudart presided over the meeting. The main topic of discussion was the programme to be adopted for the official opening night of the new Rink and Recreational Centre. It was decided to serve supper in the Town Hall, commencing at 5.00 p.m. and continuing on until the programme in the rink commences later in the evening.

Following the hockey game and skate in the rink, the serving of supper will continue at the Town Hall, followed by a dance. The various committees and individuals to carry out the various duties necessary to the successful holding of the evening's entertainments were appointed. Eight women, four appointed by the Town Council and four by the Community Welfare League will canvass the Town for donations for the supper.

The arranging for the night's hockey game will be handled by the rink managing committee. Invitations will be extended to a representative of the Government, the Department of Physical Fitness, the Southern King's Hockey League and local representatives to attend the opening and deliver remarks prior to the hockey game. The Town Clerk was instructed to post notices calling for tenders from parties willing to operate the canteen in the rink for the hockey and skating season.

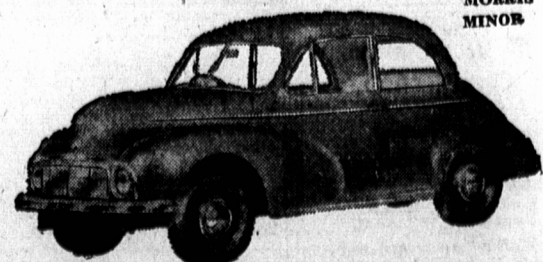
