Question For Ontario Plebiscite

(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, April 8.—The questions to be submitted to the people of Ontario in the coming plebiscite are:

- (1) Are you in favor of the sale of the Ontario temperance act?
(2) Are you in favor of the sale of light beer, containing not more than two and a half percent alcohol, weight measure, through government agencies and amendments to the Ontario temperance act to permit such sale?
(3) Are you in favor of the sale of light beer containing not more than 2 1/2 percent alcohol, weight measure, in standard hotels, in local municipalities, that by a majority vote favor such sale and amendments to the Ontario temperance act to permit such sale.
(4) Are you in favor of the sale of spirituous and malt liquors through government agencies and amendments to the Ontario temperance act to permit such sale?
