*STREET WORK BEGUN—Work has been undertaken this week of re-asphalting cracks in the Montague street pavement. Although this pavement was laid down some 15 years ago, it is still in excellent condition requiring only intermittent care. Unfortunately the advantage of the whole is lost to some degree by the connecting bridge which is not only too narrow, but also unsafe for heavy loads. The traffic over this bridge is extremely large, perhaps one of the most travelled over bridges in the Province, since it connects all traffic moving north and south to the different parts of the country, and also to Charlottetown and other localities. The time is fast approaching when the present bridge will be insufficient to carry the quantity and load of produce which will move over it, and it would, therefore, be a wise plan to prepare for the future through the procuring of a new modern cement bridge which would be wider so as to allow two large trucks to pass easily, and able to carry heavy loads of traffic. The need is great since the present bridge has been deemed unsafe, and with the co-operation of all members of the community, the project might be brought to a favorable conclusion.
