

Hampshire School WINS HIGH HONOR

The Dominion Horticultural Society instituted a competition in improvement and beautification of school grounds, and as a cup was to be awarded in each province His Honour Frank Heartz, kindly consented to supply the funds for the purchasing of the cup for Prince Edward Island. This cup which is to be won three years before any school becomes the permanent possessor, was enthusiastically

(Mr. A. E. Dewar acting in his absence), and the Secretary of Agriculture, Mr. Wilfred Boulier. A pupil of this school, Miss Reta J. MacNeill, also had the honor of winning the five dollar prize for the best essay on "How We Beautified Our School Grounds."

Early in the spring the ratepayers, teacher and pupils began their work of beautification, which was soon evident, in the well kept lawn, the newly planted trees, the neat flower plots, the well shaded walk, and the attractive signboard.

On Wednesday, Dec. 16th, 1925 the formal presentation of the cup to Hampshire School was made by His Honour Lieutenant Governor Heartz in the presence of a large audience.

Among those present were the Chief Superintendent of Education, Mr. H. H. Shaw, the Minister of Agriculture, Hon. J. H. Myers, the Secretary of Agriculture, Mr. Wilfred Boulier, Mr. L. L. Jenkins, M. L. A., Mr. Howard Court, School Inspector, also the teacher, Miss Florence Dockendorff, the pupils, and a large number of ratepayers.

Mr. L. L. Jenkins acted as chairman. He first called upon Mr. Shaw who stated the purpose of the presentation. His Honor then addressed the gathering and after congratulating the teacher and people of Hampshire and making complimentary remarks on the school grounds, presented the cup to the trustees.

He also presented Miss MacNeill with the cheque for her essay. The other speakers, Messrs. Myers, Boulier and Court also spoke in a like manner congratulating the teacher and people of that district. Mr. David Proude, chairman of trustees, replied to His Honor, heartily thanking him for his magnificent donation.

Mr. D. T. Fraser moved a vote of thanks to the Lieutenant Governor which was seconded by Mr. James G. MacLeod.

Three cheers and a tiger were given for the Governor. His Honor then proposed three cheers for Miss Dockendorff and these were heartily given.

The meeting was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem. The following is the prize winning essay:

How We Beautified Our School Grounds.

Early last May, our school grounds were entered in the contest for the prize awarded by His Honour, Lieutenant Governor Heartz, for the most improvements made in any country school grounds during the summer months.

Immediately the rate payers of the district, teacher and pupils all cooperated in plans and discussions for

the improvement of our school grounds.

We all got together and raked up the rubbish and made a bon-fire of it. Then a number of men from the district came one afternoon with a horse and plough and ploughed a narrow strip of ground for a walk, from the main gate to entrance of the grounds to the school door.

This walk was then worked up and filled with ashes, the result being we have a splendid ash walk, leading directly up to the entrance of our school.

A number of beautiful specimens of ornamental trees were purchased and

planted equal distances apart, respectively along the north, east and south sides of the grounds, the appearance of these add to the charm and beauty of the grounds.

The part of the grounds on the right hand-side of the walk as you enter the grounds was selected for a lawn and flower garden.

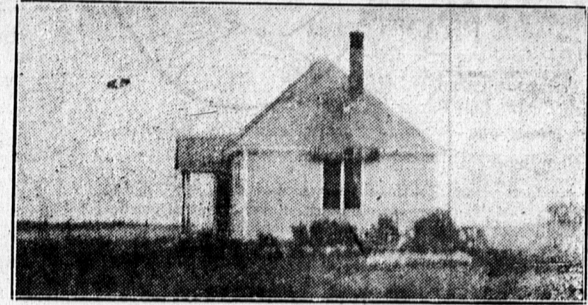
Seeds, bulbs and flowers were purchased, and three large flower beds were made.

A rectangular bed was made along the entire width of the school. This bed has for a background,

anemone, poppies, verbenas and phlox. Along the front of the grounds is a single row of poppies of different colours, also plants of ladies' shoes, and holly-hock. On either side of the gate-way is a large bunch of golden glow.

Along the western side of the lawn a large row of dahlias, rose bushes, and other plants have been artistically arranged, the whole giving a very pretty and attractive appearance to the Hampshire School Grounds.

A large and beautifully designed sign board, on the front of the school

lovely specimens of tall dahlias, of rare and exquisite colours.

Other flowers in the bed are daisies, Jacob's ladders, tiger lilies, evergreens, snap dragons, pinks and common lilies, a row of pansies and pink and white candytuft form a border for this bed.

The centre bed is a large circular one situated in the centre of the lawn around the flag pole. It consists of a variety of flowers among which are sweet peas, dahlias, phlox, stocks, pansies, gladioluses, candy tuft, iris lilies, sweet William and sweet alyssum. All contrast one with another making a lovely showing.

The only other bed is octagonal in shape, and is beautifully marked out with contrasting flowers of many different varieties among which are nasturtiums, asters, snapdragons, ger-

house, inscribed "Hampshire School, erected 1921," shows the name of our school and settlement to any passer-by, as does the Canadian flag floating over our grounds show the patriotic spirit of our Canadian people.

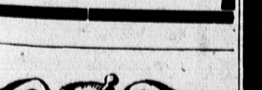
