Formerly of P. E. I.

FROM TYPHOID FEVER

Nine Years in B. C.—Was  
Chief of Police—His  
Large Funeral.

(Kaslo, B. C. Kootenai, July 18.)

Last Saturday evening Alex McKenzie succumbed to a bad attack of typhoid fever after being sick for about six weeks. On Sunday, the last services which could be rendered to the deceased were carried out when his remains were conveyed to the cemetery and followed by some two hundred of his fellow citizens to pay him their last respects. It must have been a source of great satisfaction to his aged father to see such a demonstration of respect for his deceased son, who for so many years past has been actively identified with the progress of this portion of the Kootenay country. In the early nineties he was engaged as City Chief of Police, which duties he carried out with credit to himself and satisfaction to the people. He has also been employed as foreman on various provincial public works, in opening up the country, and in execution of which he was fearless, honest and trustworthy, and his actions always gave satisfaction to the Mayor of the Corporation and the Government officials whose directions he so faithfully carried out without creating enemies. In his domestic relations he was conspicuous for his filial devotion to his aged parents, a quality which in all ages and all countries commands the respect of all men and among us here in the City of Kaslo, he will always be remembered with the respect and kindness for his many independent, integrity and honesty and an example it is an honor to emulate. He was born in Prince Edward Island on the 25th March, 1867, of Scottish parents, and came to this camp in 1892. At the house portions of scripture were read and prayer offered. At the grave the ritual of the Methodist Church for burial of the dead was used. In the evening before a congregation that filled the church, the Rev. Mr. Thompson spoke from Rev. 14. 13—Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth. Yes, saith the Spirit, they rest from their labors and their works do follow them. At the close of the sermon he paid a most earnest tribute to the memory of the deceased, who had most gladly and thankfully received his ministrations during his sickness. The choir of the church sang two beautiful anthems "Rock of Ages," and "Sleep thy last sleep" from Excell's arrangement.
