Habs Defeat Leafs To Take Second Place; Red Wings Tie Chicago 3-3

MONTREAL, Nov. 24 (CP)—Montreal Canadiens took over second place from Toronto Maple Leafs in the National Hockey League tonight by handing the Leafs a 5-3 trimming before a record Forum crowd of 13,805. Canadiens came back from a two-goal deficit in the second period to tie the score and polished off the Leafs in the final period with two tallies.

After a two-goal outburst in the second period, the Leafs appeared to tire and faded badly towards the end.

Maurice Richard, leading goal-scorer so far this season, rapped in one counter and had two assists.

IN THIS CORNER

Buck Whitlock, Nick Nicole and Mousie Dowling, three island-born hockeyists, and Gordon Drillon, former resident and player in this City, are really all doing themselves proud in the scoring column while performing with the John Beavers in the Maritime "Big Four" Hockey League up to and including last Tuesday night's game.

Whitlock is leading the parade with a total of 50 points, while Drillon, who is leading the League in goals scored with a total of 21, is just four points behind the sharp-shooting Whitlock in total points, and is sharing second-place with four others with 36 points, while Whitlock is just one goal down on Drillon in the goalkeeping department.

Nicole is one of the four who is sharing the second place spot with Drillon in total statistics and has 15 goals and 21 assists to his credit, while Dowling is in second place as far as total points are concerned, with 29, made up of 15 goals and 14 assists. Whitlock has 17 assists to his credit and Drillon has 12.

Despite the fact that Whitlock holds a formidable lead over his nearest rivals in the point-getting division, he wasn't even on the playing roster on Tuesday night when the Beavers trounced Antigonish 10-1, with Drillon picking up four tallies to move right up with the top leaders. Whitlock, Deane and Wray were all sidelined due to injuries in Monday night's game against Moncton.

Whether or not the local boys can keep up the pace they are hitting in the scoring bracket, the remainder of the season during the next few months, but there is one thing sure, judging from present and past performances, if they are not at the top they will be making it plenty hot for those who are.

The column notes that Henri Rochon, top-ranking Canadian tennis star, has been named "Top Canadian Athlete for the year" by the Sportsman's Association of Montreal. He is the first tennis star to be ever so honored by the S.A.M. and follows a long line of outstanding athletes who have been chosen for this award, including such athletes as Doug Bennett, who copped the Davis Cup net, and captain, here, two summers ago at the Charlottetown Tennis Club courts, and also teamed up with Watt in a doubles exhibition against Don and Gordon Bauld of Halifax, leading Maritime tennis stars. In fact, the Bauld brothers won the match in the most aggressive contest after Rochon had won out over Watt in a gruelling singles battle.

A member of Canada's Davis Cup team the four past years, Rochon hit the peak of his game during the season recently closed. Besides playing on the Cup team that bowed out to Australia, he won the Canadian singles championship; the Quebec Open and Closed crowns and the Ontario singles title. Probably his most impressive accomplishment on the courts was in 1948, when he defeated Pancho Guerro of Mexico in straight sets of a Davis Cup clash. This was considered a front line feat in the net world, for Guerro was first ranking player of his country and highly respected in international competition.

Annual Meeting of Local Kennel Club

The annual meeting of the Charlottetown Kennel Club Inc. was held at the Y.M.C.A. last evening with the President, Dr. G.G. Houston presiding.

Three new directors, Councillor W.H. Beaton and Messrs. Freeman Eddy and N.D. MacLean were elected for a term of office of three years. The retiring directors were Mrs. William Brehaut, Secretary, and Messrs. P.A.S. Jones and Charles MacKenzie. The new slate of officers for the coming year will be elected by an executive meeting to be held in the near future.

Dr. Houston, in his annual report, reviewed the activities of the Club during the past year, and pointed out some length on the annual dog show held at the Armouries, which he stated was equally on a par with any of the previous shows. He commended highly Mrs. Brehaut, who, he said, did an excellent job of the work in arranging the event. The President also read a report on the annual meeting of the Maritime Association of Kennel Clubs, held at Amherst, N.S. on November 6th. He pointed out many factors brought up and discussed at that meeting which should be of considerable interest to the local Club.

In closing his annual report Dr. Houston commended that emphasis be placed on the encouraging of more local entries in the annual Dog Show here, and that various owners, who own dogs of the same breed, get together in groups two or three months before the show opens to discuss their problems and prepare and condition their dogs in advance.

The financial report, submitted by the Treasurer, Mr. Stewart Ives, showed a substantial balance after the year's activities, while the Membership Committee report, submitted by the chairman, Mrs. J.O.G. Campbell, and read by the chairman in her absence, showed a paid up membership of 34 in the Club.

During the meeting, Mr. Stewart Jones gave a very interesting talk on his recent visit to the British National Field Trials and Show, held at Alamy, New Jersey, where he showed his 17-month-old Brittany Spaniel "Diana Westwood" who placed Reserve Winner's Bitch in the competition. Mr. Jones gave a fine description of the show and pointed out many helpful details concerning the way they carried out their Field Trials, which was considerably different than the way they are conducted here. He also gave some sound advice, learned from his own experience, in shipping and caring for a dog in attending such competitions at distant points.

The possibility of holding the next annual dog show in connection with the Provincial Exhibition activities was discussed at some length, and it was decided that the project would be handled over to the interest in hockey and skating at that time would be on the wane. Remodelling Community Rink At Montague

During the past week the work of remodelling the Montague Community Rink has been undertaken under the direction of Mr. Hayden Vanderstine. Following the completion of the Community Welfare League, a committee was appointed to look into the advisability of extending the ice space. After duly considering the project the committee proposed that the present dressing rooms at the east end should be torn down and rebuilt in the space formerly occupied by the old curling rink, and that the ice might then be extended the required distance.

Plans and estimates having been drawn up, the work was undertaken last week and already all the former dressing rooms have been removed and the ground laid out for the extension of the promenade. It has also been proposed that bleachers be built along the east end, so as to provide a certain amount of seating capacity for the spectators. In order to make the ice sufficiently long, the west end promenade will also be moved back to the wall, and the corners will be less rounded than formerly. This will provide greater ice space than the minimum required, so that the players will become accustomed to playing on an authorized ice space.

All dressing rooms are being built along the north wall. At one end will be the two hockey dressing rooms, in the centre two public dressing rooms, and at the other end a canteen for the convenience of the public. The office will be in the former club room which will also house the new pump which is to be drilled in the near future.

This project will mark a distinct step forward in providing ample comfortable accommodation for the public, and the Community Welfare League is striving to increase these accommodations each year. The rink will be under the management of Mr. Charles Aitken, and will, no doubt, receive the best care, and the public may be assured of receiving every consideration consistent with the proper management of the rink.

However, since these improvements are primarily for the use of the general public, it is the hope of the management that the public will co-operate, and help to look after the building which is theirs, since all are members of the community.

If it is not true, and the plebiscite is quite in order, then there seems to be considerable argument in favor of holding it in December rather than in February. If the plebiscite were held in December and a vote adverse to the Council's financing the building of a rink were polled, it would give the men who were backing the rink project plenty of time to consider alternative ways to realize their ambition. An adverse vote in a February plebiscite followed closely by spring might well have the effect of shelving the matter for another year. On the other hand, if a December plebiscite were in favor of building a rink, it would give the Council lots of time to consider the project from every angle before the actual work was undertaken.

If the plebiscite is not legal, then that is a horse of a very different color. Unfortunately as this would be for the rink enthusiasts, however, it need not mean the end of their fight. We have in mind a procedure that would have very much the same effect as a plebiscite, and would certainly be perfectly legal. The Legion and Kinsmen and others in sympathy with the idea of building a rink could insist that the council members running for election in February declare their stand on the rink question. Candidates could then be chosen carefully, having due regard for their ability to run the Town's business, to run against

those opposed to the rink project. As terms of the majority of the Council expire this year, the results of such an election might achieve the desired effect. And what a rip-roaring election we should have compared to the rather colorless affairs we sometimes have.

Personally we think the members of the Council are in favor of the rink project. One councillor has shown a lot of enthusiasm for the idea and to our knowledge none of them have spoken against it. But we who are fighting for a memorial rink in Summerside, for athletic facilities for the young people of our town, facilities enjoyed by other towns in Canada of similar size, cannot afford to pull any punches. We should have confidence in the attack and we feel that a few bombs dropped among them will not scatter their forces. The Kinsmen, a body noted for their interest in, and promotion of sports events since they were organized, are holding the right wing. Come on, you stragglers, get in line, and in step.
