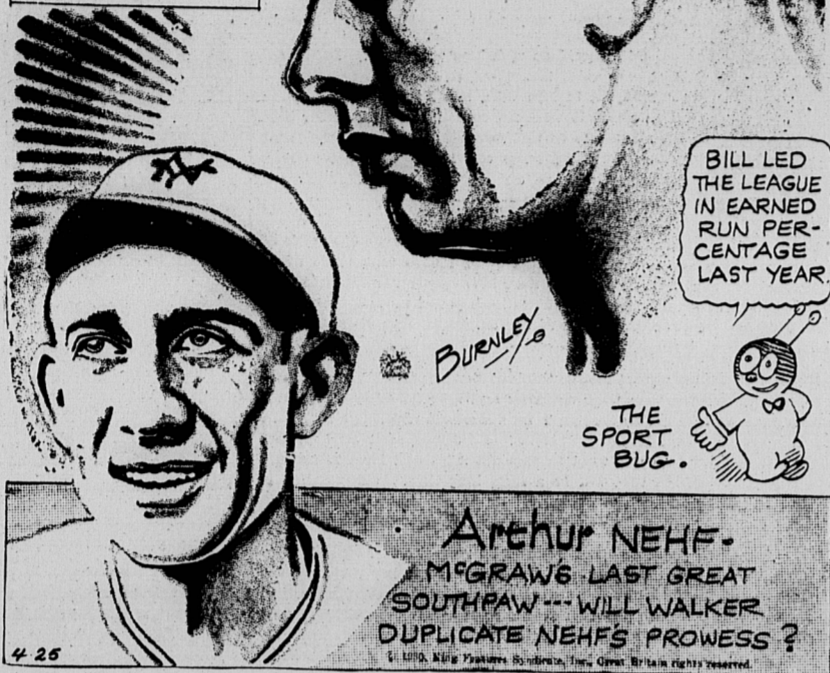

Pitching corps of all great baseball teams usually have featured one or more brilliant left-handers since the dawn of that game in organized form. John Lee Richmond was the first of the illustrious lefties. He pitched a perfect game for Worcester against Cleveland just fifty years ago this coming June 13th—not an opponent reaching first base! Some wondrous lefties have dazzled since Richmond made 'em blink! 'Lady' Baldwin, Tom Ramsay, Rube Waddell, Doc White, Rube Marquard, and a score of others! Not forgetting Babe Ruth who was a sizzling "southie" when with the Red Sox before he inaugurated his Homeric Age!

Perhaps the New York Giants have

utilized more than any other team, John McGraw, starting his twenty-eighth season as manager of that team, has won ten pennants in which great southpaw pitching has helped much. Remember "Hooks" Wiltse, second only to the immortal Mathewson in 1904 and 1905? Then Marquard at his best in 1911, '12, and '13? Ferdie Schupp and Rube Benton in '17? And the masterly Art Nehf in 1921-24 inclusive?

Now the Giants' "Lil' Napoleon" is banking on Bill Walker, Carl Hubbell and Herb Pruett to help the New York Nationals win their eleventh pennant under the McGravian management. In earned run averages, Walker led his league's pitchers

in 1929 with a 1.50 per game, winning fourteen and losing seven contests. Hubbell in 1929 pitched 18 wins (including a hitless, runless victory) and lost 11. Pruett was purchased from Newark last winter when he had staged a great comeback after being sold to the minors by the St. Louis Browns.
