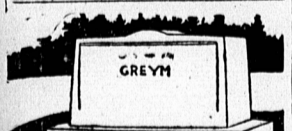

Charge Poland With Arming Terrorists

PRAGUE, Nov. 20 —(AP)—Czech newspapers openly charged Poland today with arming terrorists and transporting them in military automobiles to the frontier for operations in Carpatho-Ukraine (Ruthenia), Czechoslovakia's easternmost province.

They alleged that some terrorist leaders were "officers of the Polish Army."

Reports reaching here said one Polish terrorist was killed and several wounded last night at Nizny Vereky in a skirmish with Czech guards. The official news agency Saturday said Polish and Hungarian bands caused six deaths in the last few days in border skirmishes.
