

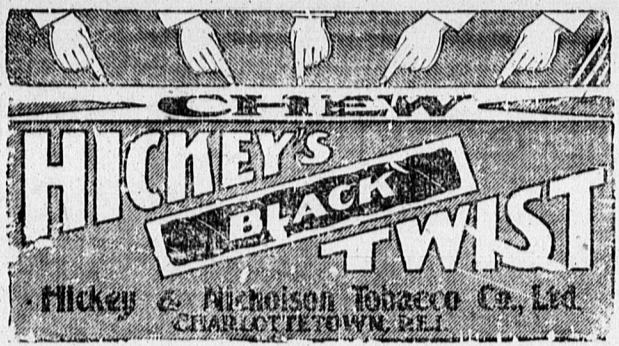

them during the summer at two very successful and enjoyable spinning bees at each of which there were over twenty spinning wheels. They knit 200 pairs of socks and shipped them away to our soldiers, also 45 pillow cases, 40 pyjama suits, 2 pyjama coats and 3 nightshirts. Besides that they packed 73 comfort boxes which they mailed direct to our boys overseas; many of these boys wrote back very cheerful letters, acknowledging the receipt of the boxes. Since this branch was organized on Jan. 4th, 1917, they have collected the handsome sum of \$1,548.36 which shows that they have not been idle, and now they have every reason to be proud of their work. Before adjourning the meeting the secretary reported that there were 25 pounds of yarn still on hand, which will be knit as soon as possible for the unanimous vote of the meeting was to continue the good work of the Red Cross for another year.
