tion and the gross results would be a sum sufficient to put them through college. All this is sacrificed that our teachers may be supported, yet no word of it is heard in their arrangement of the long-suffering public.

As to their treatment by the government they have been exempted from poll-tax, in almost every case from property-tax and even the income-tax has been arranged so that the teachers are exempt.

Apart from the financial aspect of the case which we consider that we admit them into the best of our local society almost on an equal footing, that we allow them to take a prominent part in all local functions and that we show our supreme confidence in them by entrusting them with the care of our children. I will challenge any teacher to refute my statement that they have been not only fairly but generously treated.

Some eighteen years ago the Napo State Hospital of California began to use registered Holstein sires on its dairy herd. This practice was continued without a break until today the dairy herd of high grade Holsteins, with a few registered animals besides, is one of the most outstanding ones in California, if not in the country. Business Manager Owen Duffy has developed this herd during the last five or six years until it has attained prominence all over the United States.

The other day, Dairy Superintendent T. J. Brown got out his books and put together the following figures:

Average herd during 1919—190 cows, of which 42 were heifer calves.

Production—145,293 gallons milk.

Average Number of Cows in Dairy Herd—91.

Total Production (money) value \$74,315.49.

Total Expense—\$50,769.20.

**MR. DANIEL MACINNIS**

The passing of Mr. Daniel Macinnis of Winslow, P. E. I., on April 19th 1920 is a keenly felt loss to his neighborhood.
