THE INFLUENZA - The Provincial Health Officer, Dr. Creelman stated that so far he has received replies to a questionnaire concerning the incidence of influenza in this province from nine doctors - eight in this city and one in Summerside. These report 138 in Charlottetown and 8 in Summerside, which together with four cases reported from other sources brings the total up to 150. Dr. MacMillan, the City Health Officer, states that he has 25 cases of the disease under his charge. There are about 15 physicians in the city, and assuming that each of them had charge of 20 patients, this would bring the total up to some 300 cases, which would seem to be somewhere near the extent of the infection at present.

CITIZENS MEETING in Kensington Friday night 8 o'clock to consider light contract.

WHY THE SLUMP IN EELS? Not many days ago, at Wellington there embarked on board Supreme Chief "Cy's" great war chariot, fifteen select members of the Ancient and Honourable Clan of "Fishers of Eels." Promptly at ten P. M., the heavy vehicle laden with spears, darts, trawls and all other necessary equipment, together with sufficient provisions for the "crew," departed for the far-off fishing grounds which were supposed to be located somewhere near Oyster Bed Bridge. Bateese, an experienced traveller and guide, who had recently visited the neighbourhood, was selected to act as pilot. He said this river was known as Wheatley River, but that our Micmac friends called it "Katakaddy" meaning "eel grounds," from the almost fabulous quantities of eels it was supposed to contain. Guided by their experienced clansman, swiftly and surely the great wagon rode, past hill and down dale, in an easterly direction, until the great hills of Muntler River appeared in the distance. Here, however, the guide's memory seemed to fail him completely. The chauffeur left to his own resources for several hours circumnavigated the greater part of Queens County but by making a sufficient number of mistakes he finally found himself at a very early hour in the morning, in the yard of a well known resident of Oyster Bed Bridge. After considerable parley, the party was finally admitted into the house where they hastily helped themselves to the store of provisions so generously provided. This done, the signal was given to proceed to the famous fishing grounds of "Katakaddy." Within the short space of two hours, as some of the most credible clansmen aver, Wheatley River ice from the bridge to Oyster Bed was covered with a confused wiggling layer of eels. Just at daybreak, "Joe Eli" had brought the very last eel in the river to the surface, and the signal for the return was sounded. In the hurry incident to the rather sudden departure from Wellington, no thought had been given to the question of packing and shipping such a large quantity of fresh fish, but fortunately, most of the farmers of Wheatley River had about completed their farm work for the fall, and it was arranged with about a dozen of them to pack and ship these fish to the New York and Boston markets. The recent slump in prices was in a large part due to these heavy shipments. As the vehicle was very crowded, and the roads were judged very bad, it was resolved to take home three of the smallest eels, as a trophy to be displayed in the Meeting Hall of the Great Clan of "Fishers of the Eels." It is now rumored that an appeal is to be made to the Dominion Government, through the Queen's County representatives Messrs. Sinclair and Jenkins, to have such raids prohibited in the future. It is also understood that this action had the strong support of the Prince Edward Island Fish and Game Protective Association.

The Markets

OTTAWA, Dec. 31 - (Eggs) - The continued mild weather is still having an effect on egg and poultry markets and prices continue easy.

TORONTO - The local egg market is very unsettled and tendency is easier. Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 48-50c; firsts 38-40c; pullet extras 35-36c delivered, cases returned. Prices of fresh eggs to retailers are lower at extras 55-56; firsts 45-48; pullet extras 42-44.

MONTREAL - Egg receipts here continue heavy and the market is working lower. B. C. eggs are selling on spot at extras 52; firsts 41; pullet extras 40; fresh egg prices to retailers have been reduced at extras 55-56; firsts 47-50; pullet extras 45-46; local dealers are quoting country shippers around extras 45; firsts 42; pullet extras 38. Although these prices are not paying shippers for ungraded eggs delivered, cases returned extras 40-42; firsts 38-40; seconds 28-30.

CALGARY - Receipts of local fresh eggs are increasing rapidly and quotations to country shippers are extras 38; firsts 35c; pullet extras 30c; second 25c. B. C. eggs continue to arrive and are selling here at firsts 42-1-2; pullet extras 41-1-2. Turkeys are well cleaned up and a few dealers report a shortage for the holiday trade.

MONTREAL, Dec. 31 - A feature of the domestic grain trade here today was the easier feeling that developed and spot prices were reduced one cent per bushel. Carlots of Manitoba No. 6 wheat sold 98c and feed wheat at 93c and Manitoba feed barley at 74c per bushel while Canadian western oats were unchanged. There was no change in the condition of the local flour market, prices generally being steady with a very small volume of business passing in all grades. The trade in all lines of millfeed was dull but prices were steady. The holiday quietness also affected trade in rolled oats and there was not much doing. There were no further developments in the butter market but the undertone was very firm on account of the light stocks on spot and the small supply coming forward. The demand was very limited owing to the fact that buyers in most cases provided for their holiday requirements last week. The receipts were 532 packages. The cheese trade was without any new feature to note owing to the continued absence of any demand of importance but the undertone was steady. The receipts were 68 boxes. An easier feeling developed in the market for eggs and prices for fresh grades were reduced three cents to five cents per dozen. Storage eggs other than extras were declined one cent per dozen. Receipts were 1,974 cases. Canadian beans continued to sell at \$5.25 to \$5.40 per bushel.

TRAGIC YEAR FOR MOTHER Within the past 12 months Mrs. William Jones of Cardiff, Wales, lost her husband and two sons, and a third son is now lying in a hospital seriously injured.
