Toronto Maple Leafs Defeat Rangers

Score Shutout In Furious Encounter To Tie Stanley Cup Series In Fourth Game

By Jack Calder Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO, April 9 (CP) — Checking like fiends and breaking fast, Toronto Maple Leafs defeated New York Rangers 3-0 tonight in the Stanley Cup final at two victories apiece. The Maple Leafs levelled the best-of-seven round for hockey's highest prize by outplaying Broadway's highly favored but leg-weary Blues from start to finish before 13,966 customers. There were lapses in the Toronto defensive system but then the Rangers couldn't organize a successful thrust or goalie Turk Broda was too red-hot. Gus Marker, veteran right wingman, shot the home club ahead late in the first period while each side was not a man through penalties. There were frequent Toronto break-aways from that point to the finish but the Leafs didn't make good on any until Wally Stanowski and Gordon Drillon fired goals in the closing minutes. Favored at 2 to 1 to take the cup after capturing the first two games at home, the Rangers floundered in this one after losing the third 2-1 Saturday night. Missing from their lineup because of a sprained ankle was Alex Shibicky and the team that finished the National League schedule in second place wasn't the same without him. Kibby MacDonald and Alf Pike tried to fill his spot on a forward line with Mac and Neil Colville but the result was near-disorganization. Stan Smith, Philadelphia forward who was dressed as 15th man, wasn't used at all. Defencemen Art Coulter, Babe Pratt and Ott Heiler carried a major share of the New York attack but their brisk firing through the Leafs' defense met a stern blockade in the brilliant Broda, who registered his first shutout of eight playoff games. Captain Red Horner of Toronto and MacDonald were off for high-sticking one another when Marker took a relay from Hank Goldup and Pete Langelie and skidded a 20-foot shot past goalie Dave Kerr at 19:20 in the first period. Sweeney Schriner, Gordon Drillon and Goldup were close repeatedly through the middle stages until he took the 20-year-old Stanowski in a relay from Hank Goldup at 16:03 in the third. The defenceman took Jack Church's pass on the right boards and caught a corner of the

WHEN you run out of ideas for the usual type of pictures—try your hand at unusual pictures. Look out for novel angle shots, and opportunities for "puzzle pictures." This is fun—and such shots will add novelty to your snapshot album. There are all sorts of unusual things worth trying. For example, odd lighting effects when you are taking night snapshots. Instead of having your photo bulbs at eye level, put them on the floor for a few shots,—so that they shine up toward your subjects, and cast long shadows on the wall. It's a stunt that yields surprising effects. Try shots at unusual angles. Take a picture from an upstairs window, with a subject directly below you looking straight upward. Try a steep up-angle shot of a tall building. Shoot straight down a stairway well. The picture above is a shot of a deep irregular staircase, taken with the camera pointed almost straight
