HOW BOBBY LEACH WENT OVER THE FALLS

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., July 26—Bobby Leach went over the falls in a barrel and survived with nothing worse than a number of painful cuts. It was one o'clock when it was reported that Leach would really attempt the perilous feat of going over the Horseshoe falls in his barrel. At 2.55 p.m. the launch which had Leach in tow cut the barrel adrift a short distance below Hog Island, Chippewa, the course had been well chosen, for the barrel kept in the channel and gradually drew towards the power house. Opposite the Forebay of the Ontario Power Company the rocks struck a row with such force that the cigar shaped wooden and broke off, and Leach's head was knocked against the side of the barrel and badly bruised and his right ear cut. At exactly 3.12 p. m. the crowd saw the barrel reach the brink of the mighty cataract and disappear in the wooden end, in the seething cauldron below the falls. Contrary to expectations, the barrel did not enter the eddy, which carried the others in near the falls, but swept past the Ontario power house, and then washed around too far out for those waiting to reach it until Frank Bender took a rope, sprang into the water fully dressed, and quickly reached the barrel, which he pulled in with the assistance of those on shore. anxiously awaiting news of how it had fared with the intrepid navigator. Many believed he must be dead. As soon as the barrel touched the shore a man tapped on it with a hammer, and a great shout went up as an answering tap came from the man inside. The iron manhole was quickly removed, and Leach was found to be in fairly good shape.

He was assisted from the barrel. It was thought he had broken his left leg. A stretcher was quickly procured and the injured man carried into one of the shanties near at hand, where oxygen was administered, a few minutes Dr. Wilson after an examination, declared no fracture had been sustained, but both knees were badly cut.

In explaining the injuries Leach said he had proper protection for his head, and was using his feet as a wedge, but in going over the falls he went feet first, and the jar he got when the barrel struck, threw his knees against the side, one of the first things he said after being laid on the floor of the shanty was "Somebody send to my wife and tell her I'm all right."

at Beauchamp Riding, in Essex, who was displayed by my little ten-year-old brother, who had a deep incision made in his arm. He refused to take an anesthetic and bore his sufferings bravely. Altogether some two hundred pieces of skin were grafted onto me and the operations lasted over several months.

"For months after the accident," said Mrs. Hawkey, in narrating her experience, "I lay in a very serious condition, and at last the surgeons who attended me agreed that I needed a fresh supply of skin. The question as to where it should come from was settled immediately. Relatives and friends, regardless of the pain involved, vied with one another in being first to undergo the skin grafting operation."
