—POINTERS FOR HOTELS.

NEW YORK, October 4.—The decision of the Hotelkeepers' association to charge ten cents extra for bread and butter served during meals has now gone into effect, and it is estimated that seventy hotels will make two million dollars a year by the change.

—The Waldorf-Astoria, which serves on an average of two thousand meals a day, will come in for \$60,000 owing to the extra charges.

—MONTREAL, Oct. 4.—In speaking of the two new steamships, the Empress of Russia and the Empress of Asia, which the Canadian Pacific Railway is building for service on the Pacific ocean between Canada and the Orient, a C. P. R. official remarked yesterday that he felt justified in saying that the two new boats would be the safest vessels afloat.

"In preparing the plans for the new Empresses," he remarked, "we took particular care to make provision for all exigencies, and as a result the boats are as near to being unsinkable as can be built. The new Empresses are being built with double bottoms and watertight compartments, the latter being numerous and closely placed. Ordinarily, if a ship is designed to float with only two compartments flooded, a sufficient margin of safety is thought to have been allowed, but in the cases of the new Empress of Russia and Empress of Asia, should four compartments be flooded they will still float. In the matter of safety, these are the first vessels built to fulfil these conditions."

It was also stated that the new steamships would be equipped with all the other latest devices making for safety, such as wireless apparatus, search lights, submarine signals, and from the very moment they are assembled, the members of the crew will be trained in the life-saving, fire and other drills, which are a feature of all the company's steamships.

THE McDONALD CAMPAIGN.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 4.—Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of the interior made his first speech in the MacDonald by-election campaign tonight at Notre Dame de Lourdes, but contrary to expectations he said nothing on the C. P. R. increase of capital, though it is understood he will have something to say on this question later on.

He denied that western Canada had lost anything by the defeat of reciprocity, and pointed to the heavy importations by Canadian millers of American wheat at seven cents a bushel lower as proof.

"What the west is suffering from today," he went on, "is the ill effects of the rotten, dishonest and incompetent policy practised by the late government, which neither built railroads to take care of transportation nor provided storage facilities."

He attacked the policy of the Laurier government in connection with the national transcontinental, which, he said, had been marked in construction by enormous extravagance and blunder, and was loaded with so great obligations that it could never be a factor in reducing rates.

The present government was hurrying the road to completion and was also rushing work on the Hudson Bay railway through which it hoped to afford a large measure of relief in the way of reduced rates. In conclusion, Mr. Rogers said he repeated that no man in possession of his faculties could ever great obligations that it could never be a factor in reducing rates.
