The Car Owner's Scrap Book

PROPER LUBRICATION

Proper lubrication does not mean to simply turn a grease cup or pour a quart of oil into the breather pipe. To be of any use, the lubricant must reach the parts for which it is intended, and must be of a consistency that will afford protection. It is a good plan to inspect the grease cups occasionally by removing them and passing a wire through the openings. If a high pressure greasing system is used, pressure should be applied until grease oozes out of the ends of the bearings; this not only insures sufficient lubrication, but also removes the old grease which may be gummed in the oil grooves.

Into the breather pipe, only the best grade of oil should be poured. To use any other than that recommended by the car manufacturer is foolhardy; a few cents saved in the cost of a gallon for oil may mean dollars in loss of services. To add a quart of oil occasionally will not; keep the crankcase lubricated up to an efficient lubricating standard. The crankcase must be drained completely at regular intervals; otherwise the oil which is added will have little or no effect.

ELECTRICAL CURRENT CONSUMPTION

The headlamps of a motor car will draw about five amperes of current from the battery. The starting motor will draw as much as about ten miles of driving at a medium speed.

WATCH THE WINDSHIELD WIPER

The windshield wiper, which is operated by suction from the intake, may seriously affect the operation of the engine, if the rubber tube should leak. If the hose should leak, the affect is the same as a leaking intake manifold; cases have been known when the vacuum tank failed to operate due to this cause. A careful inspection of the hose from time to time is advised; if the hose is suspected, remove it entirely and close the opening with a cork; or better still, periodically replace the hose.

Inspecting Tire Casings

Both inside and outside of the tire casings should be inspected at any time they are removed from the rim. Any grit which is observed forcing its way into the casing should be removed. The larger sizes of casings are quite stiff, making it tiresome to hold them spread apart for inspection. A simple spreader can be made by cutting a notch near end of a stick. The edges of the casing are inserted in the notches after the casing is spread apart; the stick is moved around as the inspection progresses. Two of these sticks will prove helpful when repairing cuts or breaks on the inside of the casing.

Leaking Carburetor

In a great many cases, the gasoline mileage is greatly reduced, owing to a leaking carburetor. Frequently this is unknown to the driver, who places the blame on the design of the engine, calling it a gas-eater, and letting it go at that. However, a careful examination of the carburetor may disclose the fact that he is paying for gasoline which he never uses.

Leaking carburetors may be placed in two general classes; those which leak because of loose, cracked or broken connections or defective gaskets, and those which leak because of a defect, or an incorrect adjustment of the operating mechanism. Leaks of the first class are easy to detect; the broken parts and tighten those which have loosened. Leaks of the second class are not so easily seen and are more difficult to overcome. Among these may be listed, dirt lodging under the needle valve, incorrect fuel level in the fuel chamber, due to incorrect float adjustment, leaking metal or "waterlogged" cork float, and worn needle valve or seat. The car owner who is mechanically skilled may correct these conditions himself; otherwise it is best to have the work done by one skilled in such work.

Missing At Low Speeds

If the engine operates smoothly at high speeds, but misses at low, the cause may be an internal short circuit in the coil.

Brakes Squeaks and Chatters

When a break squeaks or chatters, it indicates that it is not performing its work efficiently. Chatter is caused by an alternate gripping and releasing of the bands on the drum, and by springing of the parts. As the bands are open on one side, they cannot conform to the shape of the drum, unless they are of exactly the right shape. When the pedal is pressed, if the bands start to wrap from the bottom and continue upwards on both sides, the chances of chatter are not so great, but if the bands take hold first at the top, the slack must be taken up on both sides before the bands will lay flat on the drum. Tea Importers Stand to Suffer Heavy Losses

SUGGESTED THE GOVT. SHOULD RETURN THE DUTY IN ORDER TO PROTECT IMPORT HOUSES

OTTAWA, May 5.—Difficulties experienced by tea importers owing to the removal of the duty on British tea by the provisions of the budget announced last week were brought to the attention of the House of Commons by Thomas Bell, (Conservative, St. John-Albert). He read a telegram saying that there were large stocks of tea in the warehouses at Saint John on which the duty had been paid, and suggesting that the government should refund the duty in order to save the importers from heavy losses.

The matter was one for the Minister of National Revenue, (Hon. W. D. Euler), to deal with, said Premier King. He promised to bring it to Mr. Euler's attention.

Reported missing in 1915, and later said to be dead, a German ex-soldier has just returned to his family at Bingen and related that he was captured by Russians and later settled in Siberia.

To assist its industries the Nanjing State Council has ordered all civil and military employes of the National Government to wear only clothing made from Chinese material.

For the fourth time boys of South Africa recently won the King's trophy for miniature rifle shooting, open to all boys in the British Empire, Canada being second.
