Marshall Of Air Holds Flying Ship

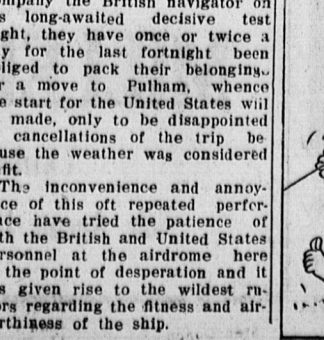
HOWDEN, ENG., Aug. 24.—The carefully-laid plans of the United States aviators for the departure of the new giant airship ZR-2 from England on her trans Atlantic flight on August 25, may have to be altered to a later date.
