## IN MEMORIAM

### MR. GEORGE PAYNTER

Mr. George Paynter for many years a respected and admired citizen, died at his home in Freetown on Wednesday, June 16, 1937, at the age of 62 years. For some years Mr. Paynter was in rather indifferent health but his health was particularly poor during the last two years, during which he suffered greatly at times. Yet he bore his suffering with fortitude and patience, and he was a man of high Christian belief, of a kind and gentle nature. He was a man of known Christian character and he continued in the Christian faith to the very end.

Mr. Paynter was born in Burlington, P. E. I., and moved to Freetown some years ago. He is survived by his wife, nine sons: Truman, John, Cecil, Horace, Fred and Walter all of Freetown, Ernest of Tryon, and George and Harold of Mass., U. S. A.; two daughters: Mildred (Mrs. Albert Glydin), of Western Canada, and Amy (Mrs. Donald Bernard) of Freetown.

Mr. Paynter was very active in the work of the church when his health permitted. He was an elder in the Freetown Presbyterian Church. For some years he was superintendent of the Sunday School. He was also a member of the Board of Managers of the Freetown Presbyterian Church, until poor health forced him to give up that work. He was also honorary president of the Freetown Presbyterian Y. P. S. In fact there was no phase of church work which did not claim his interest and support. As long as he was able he faithfully attended the services of his church.

The funeral on Saturday, June 19, 1937, was largely attended. The service was in charge of his minister, Rev. Wm. O. Rhoad, assisted by Rev. Mr. Nicholson of the United Church, and Rev. Mr. Fraser of the Baptist Church. Two of Mr. Paynter's favorite hymns were sung, "Jesus, Lover of My Soul" and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus". Mr. J. B. Lewis also sang a beautiful and appropriate solo. The pall bearers were: Messrs. George Jardine, Leslie Simmons, Silas MacFarlane, John Lewis, Frank Deacon and George Rogers. The floral tributes were many and lovely.

## Says Lower Death Rate Is Possible

EDMONTON, July 1—(CP)—Lower death rate would result from establishment in Alberta of municipal health districts staffed by experts, Dr. M. R. Bow, deputy minister of health, said in an address here.

Many rural areas do not take advantage of present day health knowledge, he said. There should be no outbreak of smallpox for instance, since sufficient knowledge is available to keep the disease completely under control.

Red Deer and High River health groups, embracing in each case several municipalities, were cited by Dr. Bow as examples of properly functioning health groups.

## Oil Fuel Prices

Prices are the chief things by which the public knows the oil industry and they are the least understood perhaps, even by oil men themselves.

Prices have been the cause of legislative and legal investigations of the oil industry, and suits against it within the industry. No other industry has had its prices and methods and family rows so well ventilated in investigations and court actions as the oil industry.

Strange as it may seem to those who may be the chief critics of the industry, oil prices from the well to the consumer, are fixed almost wholly by one factor, namely, competition—just as they are in practically every other business under the sun. There is, of course, other factors which have varying influences on price fluctuations.

But the fact remains that people in Canada and the United States are fortunate in being able to purchase their oil fuel at a price lower than any other part of the world. Auto travel is cheaper because of cheap gasoline. At a time for instance when gasoline was 17.9 cents per United States gallon in Minneapolis it was 31.4 cents in Paris, 53 cents in Berlin, 31 cents in London, England, where volume is many times any Canadian centre, 47 cents in Warsaw, and 17 1/2 cents plus tax in Montreal. All prices are governed by the world price of crude oil.

The lobster season to close on the 30th inst. has been very successful for most fishermen. Although the number of pounds landed has not been up to other years, the price paid was so considerable that it fully made up for the shortage in volume.
