Seldom has the Angel of Death made such an indelible impression on the residents of Kinkora as on the night of the nineteenth inst., when it visited the home of Mr. and Mrs. Owen G. McCarville, and claimed from them their youngest son, Aeneas, at the early age of twenty-seven years. The deceased had been in perfect health until the Tuesday previous to his death, which came as a shock to his many friends and associates, to whom he was always a medium of innocent and pleasurable pastime. But at the hearth of his parents' house it were hard to say that his death was truly missed, as it was there that his true and noble spirit shone forth in its superiority of character. He was ever solicitous for the welfare of his parents, and his labors were always made lighter by the thought that he was aiming to lighten their burdens. LT. GEN. HOSKINS ASSUMES COMMAND IN EAST AFRICA

LONDON, Jan. 26.—Lieut. General A. R. Hoskins has been appointed to the command of the British East African Expeditionary Forces, succeeding Lieut. General Jan Christian Smuts, it was officially reported today. General Hoskins assumes command in East Africa on January 30, the announcement states.

BERLIN REPORT

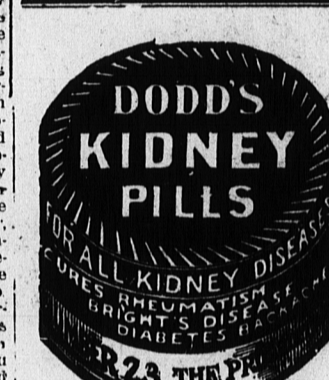
BERLIN, via Sayville, Jan. 29.—British troops, advancing in three ways, attacked German positions north of Armentieres yesterday, the war office announces. On the Verdun front four attacks were made by the French. The text of the statement reads: WESTERN FRONT.—Army group of Crown Prince Rupprecht, North of Armentieres the British attacked in three waves the position of a Bavarian infantry regiment. The attack was repulsed with the infliction of severe losses upon the enemy. West of Frommels, east of Neuville St. Vaast, on the north bank of the Ancre and north of Vic Sur Aisne, enterprises by a hostile raiding party were unsuccessful. Southwest of Lee Trastery a British outpost was captured by the army group of the German Crown Prince on the west bank of the Meuse in the Verdun region. There was lively fighting during the day. In the morning the French tried to advance by a surprise without artillery preparation against the positions on Hill 304 captured on Jan. 25. They streamed back under our fire which began immediately. Beginning at noon a heavy artillery fire was placed upon our trenches. After violent fire upon the lines there a French attack ensued, which all broke down and was without success. Westphalian infantry regiments numbers 13 and 15, and the Baden reserve infantry regiment, No. 109, tenaciously defended the captured ground on which not one foot was regained by the French in spite of their most liberal use of men and ammunition. In the Vosges a raid resulted in nine prisoners being brought in.
