ONTARIO'S RABIES EPIDEMIC.

Not much has been heard of late about the epidemic of rabies in Ontario, and now it is reported as disappearing. Some facts reported by the Toronto Globe and other journals show how serious the outbreak has been and how long it has continued. The trouble began so long ago as May, 1907 when a mad dog crossed the suspension bridge at Queenston and bit several dogs on the Canadian side of the river. These dogs in turn went mad and began to bite other animals and people.

Of course, all animals known to be infected were at once killed, but the disease has not, in three years been eradicated. At one time the disease had spread to twenty-two counties embracing nearly all of Western Ontario. Very stringent measures were adopted by the federal, provincial and municipal authorities, and for a good many months past no dogs were allowed to be at large except they were muzzled, and many thousands of dogs were destroyed. In Toronto alone 3,000 dogs were slaughtered.

The losses of owners of live stock were very large from horses, cattle, sheep and swine that were bitten and had to be destroyed. Far more serious were the cases of human beings who were torn or bitten by the rabid canines. Of such cases four hundred and eighty-one were reported, and of these over one hundred were forced to take the Pasteur treatment for protection against hydrophobia. So successful was the treatment, however, that but one fatal case occurred.

The loss and cost incurred during the three years, the result of the work of one mad dog, runs up into hundreds of thousands of dollars, for extra protective quarantine and curative work, and for animals destroyed. The amazing thing is that with all the energetic means employed the dreadful disease was not sooner eradicated. This is explained by the slow development of the disease which while ordinarily occurring from three to five weeks after inoculation, in some cases did not develop for three or four months after the patient had been bitten. There were at last report five houses under quarantine in the three counties of Wexford, Perth and Middlesex.

MARITIME UNION AGAIN.

A writer in the Moncton Transcript reproduces the stock arguments in favor of a legislative union of the Maritime Provinces. These can be summarized in a few sentences: That union is strength; that the three Provinces if united would command more influence at Ottawa; that one larger Parliament would afford a larger field for local public men, and that money will be saved by doing away with two of the three present Governments, Governments and Legislatures.

All of which apparently sounds better and more convincing on the other side of the straits than on this side. But there is nothing in the world to prevent the people of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia becoming united if they desire to do so. Nova Scotia would no doubt be quite willing to direct the legislation and administration of New Brunswick if the people of the last named Province feel that they are no longer capable of managing their own affairs. And that is what would happen if the union were brought about. Nova Scotia would have one third more members than New Brunswick in a united Parliament elected on a population basis and would control the entire show.

That is the one thing certain about the proposed Maritime Union. All the rest is problematical, especially the expected saving of money and the increased influence at Ottawa. And as to that venerable maxim asserting that union is strength, that, too, depends. The fishing rod is not made stronger by adding more joints. A marriage or a partnership does not bring strength unless the parties can live together or transact business in harmony. The union of fire and gunpowder has been known to cause an explosion.

But at this distance it would be interesting to see Nova Scotia and New Brunswick try the experiment of union. Prince Edward Island would probably stay out for a while as she did before on a memorable occasion, though that she did not stay out quite long enough, is the present opinion of many of her people. We are not yet ready to sell our hundred-and-thirty-seven-year-old legislative machinery, Governor and Government and close out business as a Province. We feel some sense of strength in our union with the British Empire, a great sense of weakness and not a little of disappointment in our union with Canada, and don't care to tie our hands with any new union cords at the present.

CANADA'S GRAND OLD MAN.

Lord Strathcona a few days ago celebrated his ninetieth birthday and was the recipient of many congratulations at that occasion. His physical and intellectual vigor are indeed most remarkable for his years, and may be envied by men who are twenty-five years his junior. He is still discharging efficiently the arduous duties of Canada's High Commissioner in London, and frequently appears at public functions, presides at meetings, delivers addresses and is continuously active and useful.

Lord Strathcona is devoted to Canada and Canadian interests, and his share in making the Dominion what it is has been very large and honorable, perhaps second to none now living. In rendering service to his country he was able also to secure for himself a large private fortune, from which he has at various times generously aided many worthy public objects and institutions. Though he served some time in the House of Commons, he was never a strong political partisan. He belongs to the entire country and Canada is proud of him.

So long a life has made him contemporary with nearly all of the growth and development of British North America. When he was born the settled portion of the country was almost entirely confined to the Atlantic seaboard and the shores of the St. Lawrence and the great lakes. There were few roads, no-railways inland, no steamships on the sea, no telegraphs or electric service of any sort. The agriculture of that day was limited in extent and extremely primitive in its implements and methods.

Between those early years and the present what a marvellous development and progress has come to Canada! Yet this is but a part of the still more marvellous progress of the British Empire and the world during the same period. As he and others of the old men of our time look back to the conditions existing in their earlier years it must seem almost incredible that such stupendous changes could have occurred within a single lifetime, but so it has been. Lord Strathcona has been spared for twenty years beyond the span of years allotted to man, and many will join in the hope that he may be spared to fill out his century of years with the full honors that belong to Canada's Grand Old Man.

JAPAN'S NEW TARIFF.

Japan has followed in the wake of the protectionist countries by largely increasing the rate of her customs duties. The British tariff commission has been examining the new Japanese schedules and finds that extensive changes have been made from ad valorem to specific duties, and that while the additions to the old tariff on dutiable goods will be about 50 per cent., on many lines of British goods, especially on cottons and textiles, the advance will reach 66 per cent.

Japan has not by any means spared her western ally in readjusting her tariff and British trade with Japan is hit pretty hard. The obvious reason for this is that British competition was most feared by the Japanese manufacturers. The new tariff will not come into effect, however, until next July when several of Japan's trade treaties with other nations will expire. It is believed that the new duties when they go into effect will prove to be absolutely prohibitive against certain lines of British goods heretofore imported by Japan to the extent of millions of dollars.

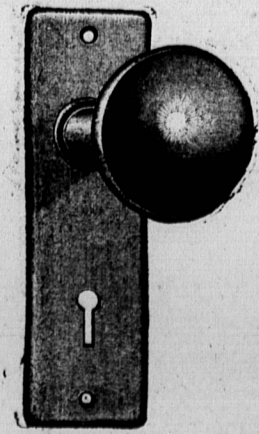
